#### **DUNDEE TOWN COUNCIL MINUTES 1553-61**

Compiled by Damian Smith, a volunteer with the Friends of Dundee City Archives. As no page numbers were present in the minutes indexing was carried out by date.

One date given as the last day of February 1561 is entered as 28th February as the leap year system was not introduced until 1582.

The Scottish New Year commenced on Lady Day, 25<sup>th</sup> March, and ended on 24<sup>th</sup> March of the succeeding year, so dates before 25<sup>th</sup> March would be in the following year to that stated by our reckoning.

## **Accounts**

All officials to make their accounts and pass the relevant money to George Lowell by the feast of Michaelmass (8<sup>th</sup> January 1553).

### **Acts**

Act concerning selling beef and mutton at the market (2<sup>nd</sup> October 1553)

Act forbidding anyone from selling or lending his firlet (2<sup>nd</sup> October 1553)

Act concerning disobeying magistrates

Penalties include: 24 hours in the stocks, banishment and begging forgiveness from the offended party at the market cross, the stool of repentance used for women (8<sup>th</sup> January 1553)

An act preventing any freeman from being a factor to unfreemen (8<sup>th</sup> January 1553)

An act concerning persons entering and leaving the town without paying the duties, offenders to be placed in the tollbooth or outlawed (1<sup>st</sup> October 1554)

Due to a slate shortage in Dundee, persons only permitted to buy enough slates for their own immediate needs, none to be taken to Leith or Edinburgh (3<sup>rd</sup> January 1555) [slates might be wooden shingles]

An act concerning Council Members who are found guilty of misconduct, the most serious offences to result in removal from office, all punishments at the Provost's discretion (1<sup>st</sup> October 1554).

An act against blasphemers of God's name, first offence punished by a 5 merk fine, further penalties the same as for drunkards (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561)

An act concerning the selling of cloth (28<sup>th</sup> February 1561).

## <u>Bellman</u>

Fees for the bellman set (5th October 1556).

## Big Biggins (to build)

A building for the flesh trade to be built on the paved area to the west of the Castle Burn where the middens and scald market now stand. The stone from the Greyfriars to be used (14<sup>th</sup> October 1560).

#### **Blasphemy**

Act against blaspheming the name of God (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560).

## **Bulwark**

The bulwark to be repaired (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560)

### **Branks (Similar to Stocks)**

Any person leaving filth in any area of the town to be put in the branks for 24 hours (2<sup>nd</sup> October 1559)

### **Brewing Illegal Alcohol**

See Wobbis

#### **Castle Burn**

Act on the people living in the Castle Burn area, no pests or any unlawful thing to be kept in the closets. In addition, no filth or pests to be thrown in the Marketgate Wynd or Vennel (2<sup>nd</sup> October 1559).

## **Claims**

An act on judges to hear claims made by poor people and not to dismiss them (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561).

### Cloth

An act against fraudulent cloth dealing, specifically cutting and colouring the cloth (10<sup>th</sup> January 1557).

A mark to be sewn into the genuine cloth (10<sup>th</sup> January 1557).

Thomas Gardyne appointed seller of cloth (10<sup>th</sup> January 1557)

Only black or green cloth allowed to be sold (10<sup>th</sup> January 1557).

### **Common Kist**

Not to be opened without a baillie, three Council members and the three keyholders present (1st October 1554).

## Council

The Council to meet every Thursday before noon in the Council house (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561)

# **Drunkards**

An act against drunkards, for first offence, a show of open repentance, for second offence banishment for a year and a day (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561).

An act against drinking during preaching or prayer time on Sunday (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561).

## **Fornication**

Act against fornication, for the first offence being admonished in front of the congregation, for the second offence to be put in the branks (restraints) (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560)

A further act against fornication, penalties include two days and two nights in prison, repentance or a year's banishment (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561).

## **Greyfriars**

See Biggins (14th October 1560).

## Kirkmaster

A godly and well-known man to be made kirkmaster (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561)

## **Kirkyard**

The kirkyard to be kept tidy, all trees and stones to be removed (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561).

Fines or dunkings in the sea to be used to enforce the above act (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561)

Bell ringing to be organised (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561)

## **Loading**

No loading or handling of tackle allowed in the Burgh during the night (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560)

### **Locked Book**

Not to be opened except in the Tollbooth with the Council present (1<sup>st</sup> October 1554)

## Measures (Quantity in a Bowl and Peck)

Measures at the market and fisheries to be brought in line with the Edinburgh measures (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561)

### Middens

Any person in town owning a midden to clear it away by Wednesday. No further middens allowed in the Burgh (2<sup>nd</sup> October 1559)

A daily patrol started to find anyone breaking the act against middens. Offenders to be held in the steeple until fines are paid. (24<sup>th</sup> September 1561).

### Multure

The measure of multure wheat from the common mylnes set at 2 bowls 1 peck (4<sup>th</sup> October 1551)

### Office

No office bearer to be appointed in secret or private, only by vote in the Committee meeting (5<sup>th</sup> October 1556)

# **Piermasters**

John Fotheringham and Andrew Annand the elder to be piermasters (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560)

# **Petty Customs**

A table to be made of the petty customs (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561).

## **Privy Seal**

To be kept by the treasurer (1<sup>st</sup> October 1554)

# **Pupil's Money**

An act concerning money for hiring tutors for the school pupils, the money to be kept in a locked cupboard and the keys to be given to respectable members of the Council (28<sup>th</sup> February 1561).

## <u>Salmon</u>

The recent act of parliament regulating the size of salmon barrels to be enforced (2<sup>nd</sup> October 1559)

An act concerning salmon and herring fishing (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561).

## **School**

No children to be taken on at the school without a testimonial (2<sup>nd</sup> October 1559).

### Ship

Any ship arriving at the pier to report the cargo to the piermasters. Fines for laying to be enforced (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560)

No ship to cast off ballast without the piermasters permission (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560)

Ships at the shore to make way for newly arrived heavily laden ships (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560)

Act against ships that block the passage of other ships (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560)

Act against ships being parked too close together and damaging the pier (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560)

### **Shore**

A shore officer to be appointed, to keep a permanent watch on the ballast of ships and to keep an account of goods coming in (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561)

### **Slates**

Act forbidding any sailors taking slate out of town as it is needed to repair the damage done in the recent English invasion (5<sup>th</sup> October 1556)

### Stipend

The ministers' stipend set at 150 merks annually (24th September 1561).

### **Stone**

Only one type of stone allowed to be brought sold or used for building in Dundee (10<sup>th</sup> January 1557).

### Tax

The baillies to set tax levels for the inhabitants; they choose when a tax or stent demand is sent to the town (1<sup>st</sup> October 1554).

## **Testament**

Due to persons being tricked into making false wills and testaments two honest men to be appointed. These men to visit the sick and ask if a will is required (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561).

### **Tollbooth**

Act concerning defendants who speak without leave in the tollbooth (2<sup>nd</sup> October 1559)

Act against persons failing to appear before the magistrates in the tollbooth on the required day (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560)

All cases to be heard before noon, measures to be taken against defendants who refuse to appear (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561)

### **Timber**

Timber lying on the pier for longer than arranged to be charged extra (4<sup>th</sup> October 1560)

## **Vagabonds**

The act against vagabonds to be enforced, prosecutions to take place every quarter. Persons taking vagabonds into their homes to be also prosecuted (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561).

### Vice

Acts to reduce vices in the town.

- (a) Act against slandering honest women
- (b) Act against running a brothel
- (c) Act against vagabonds
- (d) Act against beggars
- (e) Act against children crying/playing during church sermons
- (f) Act against night walking after 10 pm

All offences punishable by banishment (10<sup>th</sup> January 1558)

### Further acts

- (a) Act against adulterers
- (b) Act against fornicators
- (c) Act against servants who commit fornication
- (d) Act against blasphemy of the elders
- (e) Act against drinking in the presence of the provost
- (f) Act against blasphemy blasphemer to make amends
- (g) Act against trading/opening of stalls during sermon times on Sunday (2<sup>nd</sup> October 1559)

## **Wages**

Because of past extortion by Council Officers, namely the robbing of widows and orphans, wages for Council Officials to be set at 2p annually. (10<sup>th</sup> January 1561)

## **Walkers**

All walkers forbidden from selling or delivering any cloth unless the seal of the town is on it. (2<sup>nd</sup> October 1559).

# **Wobbis (Brewing Illegal Alcohol)**

The act against this to be enforced on pain of banishment (5<sup>th</sup> October 1556)

## Wool

Act against buying or selling wool in private houses, wool to be sold in the Marketgate on Wednesdays and Saturdays (5<sup>th</sup> October 1556).
