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# **BACKGROUND TO THIS REPORT**

As from April 2013, the Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012 has required Police Scotland to produce and publish a Local Policing Plan (LPP) for each local authority area. The LPP clearly sets out the policing priorities for Dundee.

Performance in relation to the identified policing priorities is monitored and reviewed internally on a weekly basis. Quarterly reports are produced to allow scrutiny by Dundee City Council Community Safety and Public Protection/Neighbourhood Services Committee. This report covers the period from 1<sup>st</sup> July 2018 to 30<sup>th</sup> September 2018.

Data provided in this report is for information purposes to allow Board Members to conduct their scrutiny responsibilities.

This report will make reference to crime groupings. Groups 1-4 refer to an amalgamation of four crime groups. They are Group 1, consisting of violent crime; Group 2 covering sexual offences; Group 3 covers a wide range of crimes of dishonesty; and Group 4 includes vandalism, fire-raising and malicious mischief.

## Putting Victims at the Heart of What We Do

Putting victims at the heart of what we do remains a key focus within the city of Dundee. Having a victim centred approach allows us to consider the needs of victims at all times, working with partners to ensure the response is appropriate allows us to ensure support and preventative work takes place.

We continue to work with and utilise specialist resources internally and externally and by ensuring our staff are trained we work hard to ensure our victims feel confident and supported in the service we provide.

Within this reporting period we have continued to deploy our community teams to different events and areas to engage with victims of crime and provide appropriate preventions advice and support, whilst ensuring safeguarding remains in place.

This reporting period covers the summer months which has seen a significant amount of events and people travel into the city. As well as engaging with those travelling in and through, the local teams have been providing some significant input to communities across the city.

The Maryfield Community officers have continued to build on their good relationships with Dundee International Women's Centre and have been involved in the participation of training in respect of Harmful Practices.

It is recognised that harmful traditional practices are forms of violence which are primarily committed against women and girls in certain communities and societies for so long that they are considered, or presented by perpetrators, as being part of accepted cultural practice. Our attendance is to encourage openness and trust with local police officers and understanding that these practices are not legally acceptable in Scotland and should be reported.

Community Officers at Maryfield also continue to offer training for 3rd Party Reporting for volunteers at Dundee International Women's Centre and the Fairbridge Project.

At the start of this reporting period a Bluebell Tea Party was organised by the Downfield Community Sergeant and held at Caldrum Street Sheltered Housing Complex. This event, which was partly funded by local businesses, was aimed at promoting improved working relations between the Police, Community, Councillors, Community Safety Officers, Youth Workers and others. Over 100 people attended and as well as building relationships vital crime prevention advice was supplied to prevent people becoming victims of crime. This event received positive praise and a letter of thanks from the Chief Executive of the complex.

Prior to the School holidays and across the city officers have been deployed into schools to promote good behaviour and Internet safety advice to pupil and parents, to alert parents to the dangers which can be encountered by children using social media and the internet.

In the same theme and towards the end of the reporting period officers have been providing internet safety inputs at Dundee and Angus college, to students studying for careers in childcare and social services to assist with understanding the challenges they may face in their chosen career path.

Moving into the next reporting period we will see the change in season and darker nights and mornings. The officers will continue to provide a high quality service to victims ensuring all investigative opportunities are addressed when dealing with crime and also focus on crime prevention to minimise victims in the first instance.

As with last year we will look at areas across the city where we may have vulnerable people or places and ensure crime prevention advice and safeguarding is put in place, with the support of crime prevention items such as timer switches and bag and purse bells.

Finally, to support Children 1<sup>st</sup> who work with a variety of children some of whom have been victims of crime, officers from Longhaugh Community Policing Team participated in the annual cyclathon in Dundee raising over £300 for the charity. Not content with the cyclathon itself two of them completed it in full public order uniform.



#### Tackling Crime and ASB

Tackling crime and Anti-Social Behaviour remains a clear priority within the city. It is recognised that through early intervention and an early response we can prevent escalation and crime occurring and we work hard with partners to achieve this.

As mentioned in the last report Operation Islington, which was launched in January 2018 to tackle anti-social behaviour and violence across the city, now features as a deployment option across Tayside. It gives a defined process to implement tactics aimed at reducing crime and ASB where required.

With regards to the serious violence figures detailed below the Murder and attempted murder referred to both occurred in the first quarter and were covered in the previous report meaning there have thankfully been none in this reporting period.

There has been 1 less serious assault compared to this time last year and this reporting period sees a small increase in detection rate for serious assault.

There was an incident in the Hilltown at the rear of the Wellgate in August where a male was assaulted by four other males, the injuries were not life threatening however resulted in stiches being received. The four males aged, 50, 48, 36 and 21 were arrested and reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

Crimes of Robbery are 16 above this time last year however there is an increase in the detection rate by 4%. As discussed in the previous report there remains officers seconded to a team to tackle crimes of Robbery to ensure all available investigative opportunities are exhausted.

This team will remain in place over the next reporting period and will be reviewed in the New Year.

Violent crimes are taken seriously and internal scrutiny is provided over all of them with officers from the Criminal Investigation Department and specialists teams in Police Scotland playing a vital part in some of these enquiries.

Locally all crime is reviewed daily to identify themes, links, threat, risk and harm and a weekly performance meeting takes place to ensure enquires are being progressed with perpetrators being identified quickly, restrictions being applied and reports being sent to the Procurator Fiscal.

Tackling drugs and associated criminality remains a focus in the city, with officers seizing illegal drugs, arresting and reporting offenders and signposting vulnerable people to support services. The below is just a snapshot of the work that has taken place over this reporting period

In July a drugs search warrant was executed in Charleston whereby £14500 Crack Cocaine and £5000 heroin was recovered. As a result a 39 and 20 year old male were arrested and charged with possession with intent to supply. A report was submitted to the Procurator Fiscal.

Again in July a drugs search warrant was executed at an address and 300 tablets recovered, a 39 year old male was arrested and charged with a report being submitted to the Procurator Fiscal.

During a drugs search warrant in Charleston at the end of July, £3000 worth of cocaine and £3650 worth of Heroin was recovered. As a result a 57 year old male and 49 year old female were arrested and charged with being concerned in the supply of drugs.

In the Douglas area during August, 1 kg of Heroin and 368g of Cocaine were recovered resulting in a 53 year old woman and two males aged 35 and 48 being arrested and charged, with a report being sent to the Procurator Fiscal.

In September £7397 pounds worth of Cannabis was recovered and a 52 year old male charged and reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

In the Hilltown in September £6365 worth of Heroin was recovered and a 52 year old male arrested and charged with a report being sent to the Procurator Fiscal.

In Kirkton during September £4978 worth of Cannabis was recovered and a 30 year old male and 31 year old female arrested, charged and reported.

Acquisitive crime is always a focus with this ranging from opportunist crime to planned crime series.

There has been a small increase in House breakings compared to this time last year with 6 more recorded, however there is a slight increase in the detection rate taking it to 30.4%.

Across the city the Community Investigation Unit (CIU) review the House breaking crimes and look for early detection opportunities and links across the city, division and wider.

In August there was series of break in's in the Lochee area which included break in's at the Lochee Sports Bar and Furniture Factory.

This enquiry resulted in four offenders being identified and charged:

One for three counts Theft by House Breaking, one for Theft by House Breaking, one for a crime of reset and another for a Theft by House Breaking and a House Breaking With Intent.

In September a 37 year old male was arrested and remanded for a Theft by House Breaking to a charity shop in Perth Road.

The CIU have also been responsible for detecting a spate of break ins to vehicles across the city whereby a male aged 31 was charged with three counts of Theft from a motor vehicle, a theft of motor vehicle, two vandalisms and a fraud.

In September a male aged 26 was arrested and charged with Theft by opening a lock fast place at Bookers Cash and Carry, Arnold Clark Mercedes.

An action plan has been put in place to cover the Longhaugh area, as there has been an increase in anti-social related behaviour. Joint Partnership work is underway to tackle this and we are ensuring that all crime is being recorded and offenders are being dealt with.

There have been two significant fires during this reporting period.

The first on the 11<sup>th</sup> of September at Braeview Academy which has resulted in significant damage and loss and mass disruption to the education establishment. The Criminal Investigation Department (CID) have led this inquiry which has resulted in a 15 year old male being identified as responsible and reported to the Youth Justice Assessor.

On the 12<sup>th</sup> of September there was a significant fire at the indoor market in the Hilltown. Again this investigation was led by the CID and four males aged 13, 15, 16 and 19 have been identified as responsible and a report submitted to the Youth Justice Assessor and Procurator Fiscal.

There has not been any identified link to these crimes although clearly similar in circumstance.

Moving into the next reporting period, there will be high visibility patrols for Halloween and Operation Moonbeam will run to support plans around Bonfire night. There will be a partnership approach to this with a Police resource dedicated to working at the Scottish Fire and Rescue control room at McAlpine Road and there will be joint patrols with Community Wardens and the Anti-Social Behavior Team.

The Festive Policing Plan is being worked on and again there will be high visibility patrols in the city centre, at the industrial estates and at our pubs and clubs with the night time economy.

Protecting Vulnerable People

It is vitally important that in Dundee we work with our communities and partners to ensure that vulnerable people are protected. Our community teams remain instrumental to this as does our partnership working through the Community Safety Hub, and its current and revised structure. We ensure that vulnerability is identified and the appropriate mitigation and support is put in place.

Compared to this time last year, there is an increase of domestic incidents reported to Police however there is a reduction in how many of these result in a crime.

Officers ensure full engagement with those reporting domestic crime and scrutiny is provided to these incidents daily. Support is provided by the Domestic Abuse Liaison Team and they work with Woman's Aid and other 3<sup>rd</sup> party organisations to ensure all safeguarding measures are taken.

There are no apparent themes or trends that have been identified in relation to the reduction in these crimes.

There have been 25 reported hate crimes since April this year to the end of this reporting period. This is 2 less than this time last year with a current detection rate of 65.1%. A serious and significant crime type, these are reviewed and progressed to ensure quick resolution as well as looking at safety measures, trends and patterns. None of which exist in these offences. Officers provided training to encourage 3<sup>rd</sup> party reporting and there are good liaisons in place through the Community teams with our diverse communities to ensure reporting and prevention. In addition, in puts are completed at Schools around the inappropriate use of language and the affect hate crime can have on a member of the public and community.

Throughout this reporting period Community Officers have given personal safety talks to numerous vulnerable groups within our community. This includes home and personal safety talks to the elderly, internet safety to youth groups and participating in numerous school inputs from Primary 1 to Secondary 6 year groups.

Officers continue to work closely with vulnerable young adults chosen as candidates for Princes Trust in an effort to guide and encourage moral compass.

Kerb crawling and Prostitution reports have increased in recent months in the Maryfield Ward. Unfortunately with the loss of funding to Vice Versa who were actively engaged with these women and supporting them, the Community officers are attempting to tackle these issues by working with the Anti-Social behavior team balancing the needs of their vulnerability along with the complaints of ASB from local residents. ASBO warnings have been issued to kerb crawlers and prostitutes and liaison is ongoing through community safety, Procurator Fiscal and other partner agencies to ensure these women can be supported following any arrest/prosecution.

In November Dundee will be the first area to roll out the "Ask for Angela" scheme. This will take place at the end of the month and is leading the way with processes and training already in place in our night time economy. The idea being that people who meet up for drinks with people they have met through dating sites and find themselves in an uncomfortable position of concerned for their safety can go to the staff and "Ask for Angela" this will result in the staff understanding they need help and support and they

will get them out of their current situation. A full media campaign will be put in place to highlight this.

This year's first Dundee Pride event was attended by thousands of people, it was a fantastic day with great partnership working and community engagement. The Gay Police Association attended and took part in the march as well as various local partners sending out a positive message of inclusion to all. Below is a picture of the Maryfield Community team who were out assisting and supporting the event.



Moving into the next reporting period the plans around festive safety and winter driving campaigns will take place which ensure that our most vulnerable are supported during the most vulnerable months.

### Maintaining Public Safety

Ensuring that our Communities within and the people who visit Dundee are safe is a primary focus for us. The Locality Inspectors and Community Policing Teams have a pride in their areas and have a drive and dedication towards maintaining public safety. The response officers that cover the city focus on dealing within initial Threat, Risk and Harm and are dedicated to resolving and mitigating this.

As mentioned earlier in the report this quarter covers the summer period so there has been a number of events which have required to be policed and the city has seen a great increase in footfall due to these.

These included Operation Roll which was the planning around President Trumps visits to Scotland, the Open Golf at Carnoustie, the BBC Big weekend, Rewind, Various music events at Mary Slessor Gardens and the spectacular opening of the VA and Dundee's first Pride event.

Local officers have been involved in each of these and the city has also benefited from National support. During each of these the policing focus is to ensure a safe and secure event minimising disruption and criminality. The events in Dundee saw very little crime attributable to them with all being run safely and successfully.

Go Safe initiative is in place across the city with a focus on the new school term around safe parking and drop offs and encouraging walking to school. In August, the launch of Safe Walk to school took place from Dundee City centre to local schools, attended by community officers, elected members and partner agencies.

In addition, Joint road traffic/parking patrols have been carried out with Council Parking Attendants outside local schools with particular attention given to areas where irresponsible driving and parking is most prevalent.

Throughout this reporting period officers have deployed at various events across the city to ensure public safety and develop engagement.

Inputs have taken place in conjunction with the new school term to primary and secondary schools regarding bullying, knife crime, drugs, violence and anti-social behavior and work continues with wardens and ASB teams to ensure we are visible in areas that require additional support.

Local fun days have been attended and officers have set up stalls providing home security and safety advice.

Longhaugh Community Officers engaged with the public at this year's Ferry Gala event – here they are seen with the other local heroes.



The food and flower show at Camperdown park was again well attended this year with officers setting up a stall to provide crime prevention advice and to attract members of the public to apply to become a Special Constable.

Visits have taken place at sheltered housing units promoting personal and home safety and engagement continues developing positive links with wardens and support staff.

The Safe Taysiders event ran in this reportingperiod capturing all Primary 7 children, 1200 from across the city, assisting with highlighting danger and giving practical advice around keeping safe.

Operation Challenge patrols were carried out in St Marys. Op Challenge aims to reduce thefts and anti-social behaviour issues involved with off road motor bikes. The bikes are often used on streets and through parks to race across the width of the city. One motor bike was identified and seized from one of the main protagonists who has been reported for a number of road traffic offences.

Additional patrols will be put in place in the next reporting period for Halloween, Bonfire night, Christmas light switch on and general Festive activities.

The behave or be banned scheme will continue to operate during the night time economy and pop up stalls will be utilised in and around the city centre to provided reassurance and safety advice.
