1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To gain Committee approval for changes to the Local Nature Reserve boundary at Riverside Nature Park.

2. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- 2.1 It is recommended that approval be given for the de-declaration of the of the Inner Tay Estuary Local Nature Reserve within the Dundee City Council boundary.
- 2.2 It is recommended that this committee approves the proposal to declare Riverside Nature Park as a new Local Nature Reserve (and instructs the Executive Director of City Development to take forward the process of declaration).

3. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 There will be expenditure of £500 associated with this report which can be contained within existing revenue budgets.

4. MAIN TEXT

- 4.1 Under the National Parks and Access to the Countryside Act (1949), Planning Authorities have the power to declare Local Nature Reserves (LNRs) in Scotland. The process is supported Nature Scot who provide advice and guidance.
- 4.2 The Inner Tay Local Nature Reserve was declared in 1996, by both Perth and Kinross and Dundee City Council. The extent of the LNR is primarily located in Perth and Kinross and was established to protect foreshore and reed beds situated along the north bank of the Tay. Its establishment was well before the creation of Riverside Nature Park in 2011 and the boundaries of the LNR and Nature Park do not align (Appendix 1).
- 4.3 Perth and Kinross Council (PKC) have recently advised Dundee City Council (DCC) officers of their intention to de-declare the Inner Tay Estuary Local Nature Reserve within their administrative boundary. Having considered the impact of this on the area of the LNR within DCC's boundary and acknowledging the misalignment of the LNR and park boundary, it is recommended that the Council also de-declare the Inner Tay Estuary Local Nature Reserve alongside PKC. The extent of the Inner Tay Local Nature Reserve is already the subject of national and international biodiversity designations which confer greater protection.
- 4.4 De-declaring the Inner Tay Local Nature Reserve presents the Council with an opportunity to declare a new Local Nature Reserve across the entirety of Riverside Nature Park, giving recognition to its importance for local biodiversity. Appendix 2 shows the extent of the proposed LNR.
- 4.5 Riverside Nature Park is currently listed as a Key Site in Dundee's Biodiversity Action Plan as it contains a number of priority habitats and key species and has an active 'Friends of' group. The park is also the recipient of a Green Flag and an LNR designation would complement this award.
- 4.6 Both Nature Scot and the Friends of Riverside Nature Park are supportive of the proposal.

4.7 The declaration of Riverside Nature Park as a Local Nature Reserve will also require to be reflected as part of the process of reviewing the Dundee Local Development Plan.

5. POLICY IMPLICATIONS

5.1 This report has been subject to an Integrated Impact Assessment to identify impacts on Equality & Diversity, Fairness & Poverty, Environment and Corporate Risk.
