



Partnership Working

Dundee City Council, Bonnie Dundee and the Broughty Ferry in Bloom Group have been working in partnership, with other city groups to promote Dundee's entry in the Britain in Bloom City Campaign for 2015. The Bonnie Dundee Group, which is made up of members from other community groups and individuals in the city, support Dundee's entry into the Britain in Bloom campaign. The group has been busy over the past year working in their shared community poly-tunnel, potting on plug plants for the group's It's Your Neighbourhood Container Garden Project. The annual Bonnie Dundee Garden Competition continues to be popular with local residents, allotment holders, businesses and schools. This continued partnership working with Dundee City Council ensures constant improvement throughout the City.

In the last year, Broughty Ferry in Bloom have planned various events including the Annual Garden Competition, Secret Garden Trail, and a fundraising event, the Snowdrop - In. Projects the group have worked on in the last year are the floral boat at the harbour, hanging baskets for Brook Street and Gray Street, planters in the Windmill car park, pollinator and edible garden situated in the grounds of Broughty Ferry Library and a planter in Campfield Square. In addition to this they have adopted three new planters for Brook Street and a three tier planter on Douglas Terrace. Plants for all these sites have been raised in the Dundee "In Bloom" groups' poly-tunnel in the community garden in Dawson Park, using plug plants bought from Pentland Plants.

Dundee City Council's contribution to the entry is overseen by a steering group of departmental representatives and is chaired by the Director of the Environment Department. In addition to supporting groups, the Council is making major investment in the environment through the development of the Waterfront Project. The Roundabout Sponsorship Scheme is also assisting in directing investment into upgrading roundabout planting. Each year the department invests approximately £100,000 in capital projects to improve the environmental landscape.



Introduction

I am delighted to introduce the portfolio for Dundee's entry into the Britain in Bloom Final 2015, City Category. This entry and portfolio has been the result of the excellent partnership between Dundee City Council, local community groups, businesses and organisations, which has resulted in a number of environmental improvements and increased community participation.

As Convener of the Environment Committee, I am extremely proud of the public perception of the city's environment and determined to improve further the city's reputation for being a clean, green and sunny city.

To support this work, a new local campaign has been launched "Take Pride in your City", which encourages all our citizens to take pride in Dundee. The campaign focuses on litter, dog fouling, chewing gum, graffiti and fly tipping, asking people and communities to take personal responsibility for their actions.

Launched in May and partnered by the local Evening Telegraph newspaper, the campaign has already received widespread media coverage and encouraged groups to organise litter picks and planting sessions.

As the UK's first UNESCO City of Design, Dundee is bold, ambitious and committed to using design to help solve the cultural, economic and social challenges we face.

As a city rich in design heritage, with thriving design industries and huge potential for the future, Dundee embraces design principles when working to design new projects in the urban environment and when redesigning spaces for existing communities across the city.

The development of the cities green environment is key to achieving Dundee's longer term ambitions and design thinking combined with creativity is reflected in Dundee's Cultural Strategy.

The city is proud of its community involvement and environmental awards. In 2015:

- 11 Communities entered the 'It's Your Neighbourhood' Campaign
- 65 schools registered as Eco Schools in Dundee
- 9 schools have achieved Green Flag Status
- 4 Green Flags have been awarded
- 20 Additional parks are subject to our own Green Flag Assessment
- Broughty Ferry Beach has again obtained the Beach Resort Award
- 20 Litter picks undertaken in the last year as part of the Clean-Up Scotland Campaign August 2014 - until end of August 2015.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the volunteers, community groups and sponsors for their continued help and enthusiasm, within Dundee's parks, gardens and open spaces.

Public Parks & Gardens



Dundee is a green city, with 59 parks, covering 4,000 acres; Dundee has more green space per head of population than anywhere in the UK.

Camperdown Park

The largest park in Dundee stretching to 400 acres and over 190 species of tree are found in the park. The park comprises of the former grounds of Camperdown House, a 19th century mansion, which was bought by the city in 1946.



This mature woodland is the legacy of a visionary 19th century landowner Lord Robert Duncan, Camperdown is notable in horticulture as the origin of the Camperdown Elm (Ulmus glabre 'Camperdownii'), a short, broad "weeping" variety of elm which is still found in the park today. The tree was discovered in around 1835-1840 by Lord Camperdown's head forester, David Taylor, who noticed a mutant contorted Wych Elm branch sprawling along the ground. The Earl's gardener produced the first Camperdown Elm by grafting it to the trunk of a normal Wych Elm (Ulmus glabra). Every Camperdown Elm is from a cutting taken from that original tree and is grafted on a Ulmus glabra trunk. Along with 14 other woodland tree collections, Camperdown Park forms part of the National Tree Collection of Scotland.

Templeton Woods



Templeton Woods has been awarded a Green Flag since 2010. The woods were initially planted in the 1800's by David Taylor, the head

forester to the 1st Earl of Camperdown. Templeton covers over 150 acres and is used by a wide range of people and organisations throughout the city for recreation, volunteering opportunities, training for employment and nature conservation. It is a working woodland managed by the Council's Forestry Section. Red Squirrels are found throughout the woods, making Dundee one of the few cities in Britain to be a home to these rare tree-dwelling mammals.



Trottick Mill Ponds



Another Green Flag Site since 2008, Trottick Mill Ponds Local Nature Reserve is situated on the northern edge of the city. It has an area

of 3 hectares and it is bordered in part by agricultural land to the north. The site provides important links to other areas of natural heritage in the city, allowing the movement of wildlife and plant species.

Trottick Mill Ponds is used by individuals, families and groups on a regular basis. Trottick Mill Ponds is a place for passive and active recreation, education





and relaxation. Educational activities are regularly carried out at Trottick Mill Ponds including school groups, wildlife clubs and adult training in practical conservation and wildlife skills.

Dundee Law

Currently reaching the final planning stage of a \$350,000 improvement project, including a recent award of over \$80,000 from the Heritage Lottery Fund, the Law will see improved access, interpretation and community engagement. Dundee Law, a result of volcanic activity, formed around 400 million years ago, the 572-foot peak is the city's most distinctive landmark and an enduring attraction for visitors and locals. In the 1820's, the Law had a 300 metre long, 3 meter diameter tunnel driven through its eastern flank to carry the Dundee to Newtyle Railway. Originally drawn by horse, the first locomotive was introduced in 1833 and operated until the 1860's when a new railway line was built to skirt the hill.

Magdalen Green

Magdalen Green has the distinction of being Dundee's oldest city park having been in use for some 400 years and has long been used for both meeting and recreational purposes.

The bandstand, built in 1890, has become a Dundee icon and hosts concerts on Sunday afternoons during the summer. Built at the Saracen Foundry by Walter Macfarlane & Co of Glasgow it was restored in 1991. The summer of 2009 saw the start of much needed repairs to make it safe for future public use.

An active volunteer group - the Friends of Magdalen Green helps look after the park and raises funds for new facilities.





Dundee City Council, working in partnership with the Friends of Magdalen Green, has recently completed the construction of a £170,000 play area themed around local industry and historic features.

Baxter Park



Baxter Park, was designed by Sir Joseph Paxton (renowned gardener and landscape designer of his time, who worked for William

Spencer the sixth Duke of Devonshire and designed Crystal Palace) and donated to the citizens of Dundee by Sir David Baxter and his two sisters Mary Ann and Eleanor, with a trust fund for running and upkeep, managed by a group of trustees.



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The 38 acre Park was constructed over two areas of ground, the lower park being a field and the upper, a disused quarry, which was filled in for use as a part of the construction. The northern part was laid out as a pleasure garden with walks through open areas of grass and flower beds and the southern part as a parade ground. A large terrace running east-west, in front of the Sandstone Pavilion, linked the two parts.



A Heritage Lottery Grant - Urban Parks Programme, of \$3.5m was secured in February 2002 and a restoration programme undertaken which was completed in July 2008. The complete project budget was \$4.2m.

Dawson Park

Dawson Park is the result of a bequest in 1940, by Mr. William Dawson of Broughty Ferry "for the purpose of providing playing fields, sports grounds or other recreational facilities..."

The ground was purchased from the Douglas and Angus Estate in 1949, and the park was opened in the mid 1950's. Recent Improvements have involved the development of the tennis facility within the park and Increased partnership working with the Scottish association of Mental Health in the running of Duntrune Community Garden.



Barnhill Rock Garden



The first recipient of the Green Flag Award in Dundee in 2007, the Barnhill Rock Garden is a public park extending to more than two

hectares, owned and maintained by Dundee City Council with significant support from the Friends of the Barnhill Rock Garden. It is situated on part of a former nine-hole golf course which was laid out when the Dundee to Aberdeen railway line was built; is on the Visit Scotland tourist trail and is open to the public at all times.





Riverside Nature Park

Riverside Nature Park has been created from Dundee's old landfill site and opened in 2011. Trees and wildflowers have been planted to form new wildlife habitats. Visitors will find new paths, view points and information signs to help explore the park.

The Nature Park enjoys an important location on the Tay Estuary. The water quality of the Firth of Tay is one of the best in Europe for a major estuary. The estuary has many important natural heritage designations because of the number of species it supports.

The Friends of Riverside Nature Park undertake litter picks, environmental improvement projects and carry out surveys of the biodiversity of the park. Within the park and on the adjacent Tay River the friends have identified over 130 different species of birds including some rare migrants.

The University of Dundee

The Dundee University Botanic Gardens will host the Britain in Bloom tour presentation and the tour will start from there. The city centre campus covers 22 hectares in the heart of the city and is fully accessible to the public. It has over 1,000 trees, 2 wildflower areas and an orchard. The University has an ever increasing recyling rate - currently at 75% and last year through furniture reuse saved over £100,000. Also in the last 12 months they have increased the number of solar powered bins on campus to 23 and created 5 new external recycling points.10% of the workforce 'on their bikes' and have increased bicycle parking by over 500% in the last 8 years.

Dundee's 'Take Pride in Your City' Campaign

Dundee City Council has launched a city wide campaign which is being supported by business leaders, politicians and local residents. The aims to motivate city residents to help in the effort to prevent litter, dog fouling, chewing gum, flytipping and graffiti from blighting neighbourhoods.

The 'Take Pride in Your City' campaign has been rolled out across communities and public spaces. Councillor Craig Melville said "We have had a very encouraging reaction to campaigns in the past when we have focused on issues like litter enforcement and dog fouling"

"With Take Pride, we are trying to grow a sustained effort that will change public attitudes to littering and to help us all make Dundee a better place to live.

"This campaign will build on Dundee's already impressive track record on cleanliness and public satisfaction about the quality of our parks and open spaces," he said.

"I want this campaign to become an inspiration for people to play their part in assisting with further improvements in the future." Director of Environment, Ken Laing, said that many people in Dundee already helped to keep the city clean, but through the campaign it is hoped to do even better.

He said "We are aware we already score highly on cleanliness compared to other Scottish cities, but this is about ambition, and we want to improve."

'Take Pride in Your City' will also form an important part in Dundee's bid in the city category of this years Britain in Bloom competition.

Internal Green Flag Sites

The Environment Department is using the internal "Green Flag" assessments as a bench marking tool for public parks and open spaces, by using the criteria from the Green Flag Award Programme. Each rating will provide an evidence base for demonstrating continued improvement and to ensure a consistent standard. Over time it is hoped that every area within the city boundary has public parks and open spaces of excellent quality.

Finlathen Park, Downfield Park, Hilltown Park, South Road, Camperdown Park, Middleton Wood, Dawson Park, Drumgeith Park, Magdalen Green, The Law, Dudhope Park, Caird Park, Eastern Cemetery, Stobsmuir Park, Birkhill Cemetery, Riverside Nature Park, Western Cemetery, Greater Balgay, The Howff, Castle Green were all assessed in 2014.

Eco-Schools

Eco-Schools are the largest sustainable schools programme in the world and are operated internationally by the Foundation for Environmental Education (FEE). Dundee's Eco-Schools


There are currently 65 schools registered with the Eco-Schools programme in Dundee City.

- Wallacetown Nursery

Situated in the grounds of Ninewells Hospital, the independent Teddy Bear Nursery is set in an attractive natural landscape with mature trees and well maintained enclosed gardens. The nursery have received a GREEN FLAG! Eco-Schools award, which recognises their achievements towards a sustainable lifestyle.

The nursery has also been awarded a Gold Award by the Woodland Trust for getting involved in green activities including tree planting, visiting local woods and recycling.



Garden & Allotment Competition

July 2015 - the citywide annual Garden & Allotment Competition is run by Dundee City Council to encourage the community, including schools, citizens and communities, to take pride and an interest in their city. It is open to all residents within the city boundary and has 14 categories for citizens to enter. The competition is sponsored by Doubletree by Hilton Hotel, Dundee and Apex City Quay Hotel and attracts approximately more than 60 entries each year.



AUTUMN

Duntrune & Camperdown Polythene Tunnels

September 2014 - Bonnie Dundee Group, Ardler Environmental Group & Broughty Ferry in Bloom Group purchased and potted up spring bedding for 2015, at Dundee Environment Department's Duntrune Community Garden and Camperdown Park Nursery.

September 2014 - plants have been continually watered by the Bonnie Dundee Group members & Broughty Ferry in Bloom Group at Duntrune Community Garden.

September 2014 - Dundee City Council Environment Committee approved Environmental Open Space Improvements proposals to the value of £100,000 at a number of locations. The proposals have been developed to enhance the amenity whilst, at the same time, reduce the long term maintenance burden.

- Lochee Bypass Adjacent to Underpass -Improvements to existing planting with low maintenance shrubs
- Yarrow Terrace/Dochart Terrace Regenerate existing shrub beds including reshaping and replanting with new shrub varieties and establish new grass areas
- Greenbank Place Replacement of existing conifer hedge



- Riverside Drive Re-design existing planting schemes at three roundabouts; Regenerate and enhance the existing tree plantations, incorporating new shrub planting and creation of new wildflower areas; and recontour grass banking, install new seating and litter bins and minor improvements to access track west of Bridgeview Station Restaurant
- Victoria Park Re-design soft landscaping at south east entrance, including reshaping of planted areas, removal of hedging together with the installation of seating and litter bins
- Marketgait Re-design of planted areas at West Port and Seagate roundabouts
- Salton Crescent Regenerate area by undertaking landscaping and contouring works, including the removal of existing fencing and shrubs and establishing new grass areas

- Berwick Drive Regenerate southern embankment east of entrance to Braeview Academy by removing a number of tree plantations, reshaping and establishing new grass areas
- Windmill Gardens Complete final phase of high amenity planting and reshaping works
- Dawson Park Remove old heather planted area and return to grass. Upgrade path areas at sunken garden and upgrade signage at two access areas to the park.

Broughty Ferry in Bloom and Bonnie Dundee Groups show off their gardening expertise in the pallet garden competition. The Council's Environment Department won the Lord Provost's Trophy for the best show garden.

February 2015 - Improvements to the open space at Crescent Lane were made with the help of approximately \$19,000 from the Community Regeneration Fund.

Work took around 1 month to complete in early 2015. The space has become rejuvenated and more user friendly, particularly benefitting residents close by who have improved views and brighter gardens.

It was important to retain most of the existing mature trees to preserve character and habitat, while some self-seeded trees growing too close to houses were removed. New cherry and hornbeam trees were planted in a row along the footpath which will provide seasonal colour and flower.

A generous selection of native, evergreen and deciduous, flowering and non flowering shrubs were planted to provide an aesthetically pleasing and biodiverse shrub border that skirts the newly grassed space.

The end result has been received well and the space is now a more attractive gateway into the town for both pedestrians and car passengers.

February 2015 - Tree planting at Middleton Community Woodland, trees provided by the Woodland Trust and planted by Dundee Countryside Rangers, Bonnie Dundee and Dundee Conservation Volunteers.

Dundee Waterfront Mary Slessor Garden Construction

At the heart of the Central Waterfront area will be a large avenue of open space extending from the existing Caird Hall Complex to the water's edge.

The main parkland area is Slessor Gardens, 10,738sqm in size and designed to be a multi-functional space with capacity to host large events. Works to deliver Slessor Gardens were tendered in 2013 and contractors started on site in February 2014. It is expected that works will be complete in early 2016.



The works include the completion of all remaining road and drainage infrastructure works, a Sustainable Urban Drainage Pond and Slessor Gardens.

The proposed Waterfront is adjacent to the River Tay

and extends to 5,415sqm. It will contain the UK's only outpost of the V&A Museum.

Construction Progress

November 2014 - Tree planting programme is underway at the Waterfront.


May 2015 - Work on the paved areas continues as well as the surfacing of South Castle Street and South Crichton Street. Work has now commenced to install the footway alongside Thomson Avenue and on Earl Grey Place West.





April 2015 - Work continues on the construction of South Castle Street and South Crichton Street and associated parking areas. Construction has commenced on the footways within Slessor Gardens and all of the trees which will surround the lawn are now in place.

March 2015 - The main central open space is now officially titled 'Slessor Gardens', the works to form the boundary footpaths are continuing and the new roads to either side (South Crichton Street and South Castle Street) are taking shape. All the underground works for utilities are now complete, with all the cables and pipes installed and buried. There are 76 pleached limes around the main grass



area of Slessor Gardens. Similar to the main roads, the trees have been planted within a tree trench constructed using GreenBlue Urban (formerly Greenleaf) planting system i.e. plastic cells filled with topsoil. There is a useful description of the space on the Dundee Waterfront website.

Work is underway to develop new smaller gardens. There are no real planting details for them yet, but it is currently thought that these will be sponsored in order to fund the landscaping of the areas. They are currently the subject of a competition.



Heritage walk



May 2015 - Whorterbank Community Garden

This new vegetable patch is the result of lots of hard work by the local children to clear the weeds and get this area ready. 'The Whorterbank Tattie Patch' is a project supported by Dundee City Council's Community Allotment Officer. Dundee City Council's Fairness Strategy and Action Plan identified the need to introduce community allotment initiatives in Community Regeneration Areas. In May 2013 Dundee City Council's Environment Committee gave approval to the Director of Environment to take forward three community allotment projects and to identify funding for a Community Allotment Officer to co-ordinate the project. 'The Whorterbank Tattie Patch' is an example of a project being taken forward. We hope people will enjoy watching the plants grow and want to eat some of the produce at harvest time.

Broughty Ferry Gala Week

July 2015 - Broughty Ferry Gala Week is the town's annual Summer Festival. The Broughty Gala Week, has been a hugely popular and a regular event since the early 1900's. It is now is regarded as the foremost summer community festival in Tayside. Organised by the Broughty Ferry Traders' Association, the week-long packed programme of daily and evening events cater for children of all ages and adults alike, and commence with The Gala Week Fete held at Castle Green on the opening day. A full Gala Week booklet is also available from local shops at that time. Many of the events are free of charge and sponsored by Broughty Ferry Businesses and Monies raised during Gala Week are donated to local charities and organisations in Broughty Ferry.





AUTUMN

September 2014 - Queen Street Garden, Grove Academy have been working hard to increase biodiversity and to find out exactly which plants are growing at Queen Street. After the summer holidays some pupils began clearing away the growth of the summer. They managed to clear enough space to sow the 'Grow Wild' seed mix. The first work session ended with harvesting veg from last season sowing. The carrots were an interesting shape! The spinach, chard and parsley are still growing and can continue to be harvested this year. Clearing away the rest of the growth was so much easier with a strimmer! One new volunteer came along and cleared the rest of the area making the site much more presentable.

October 2014 - Dundee City Council and award winning 'It's your Neighbourhood' entrants from Dundee travel through to Stirling to attend the annual KSB Awards Seminar. The 'It's Your Neighbourhood' Campaign provides an opportunity for smaller community groups to get involved in the wider RHS Britain in Bloom campaign. Dundee City's community gardening groups are focused on cleaning and greening up their local area, on the streets, housing estates and in their local community centre's outdoor spaces. Eight Dundee groups participated in the scheme in 2014 and a further three groups are taking part in 2015.

Ardler Environment Group - Thriving

The group has worked together for over 10 years to enhance their neighbourhood. There are three small gardens at the entrance to the Ardler Community Centre, which give a colourful and interesting welcome to users.

Castlehill Gardeners - Thriving

The garden, on a small area beside the Ark Nursery and St Paul's Cathedral, is a little jewel in the city centre. It is crammed with innovative learning opportunities and is a model for others to replicate. The groups' mission is: We aim to brighten your day. We hope we succeed. You do indeed.

Bonnie Dundee – Thriving

The Container Garden Group continues to plant, water and maintain a range of planters in the car park beside the Dundee Science Centre and on Union Street in a busy section of the City.

Friends of Barnhill Rock Garden - Outstanding In existence for over 15 years, with a membership which now nears 500, the Friends of Barnhill Rock Garden work in close partnership with Dundee City Council and the full time gardener to maintain and develop a highly regarded and much appreciated amenity in Broughty Ferry.

Queen Street Car Park Wildflower Garden - Thriving This tiny area between a busy car park and the railway line in Broughty Ferry has been transformed into a swathe of colour over the years by students of Grove Academy and adult volunteers led by Mary Holligan.

The MaXwell Centre Everyone's Garden - Thriving In a very short time a derelict site has been transformed into a productive, attractive and welcoming community garden.

The Miley Group - Thriving

The Scottish Wildlife Trust initiated this wildlife corridor on a mile long track which was part of the former Dundee to Newtyle Railway line in 1992.

'The Miley' has been tended by an enthusiastic group of volunteers to sustain a varied habitat for a wealth of wildlife. It is appreciated by residents as a peaceful sanctuary in the heart of the city

New for 2015:

Transform Community Development

A local group who aim to create a better environment for communities to the north of Dundee.

Enactus Dundee, are a group of students who are striving to improve the local community through entrepreneurial actions. The group looks after a community garden at the University of Dundee Botanic Gardens, the group runs a facebook page and has gained donations from Mole Seeds, Thompson and Morgan and Sutton Seeds.

Menzieshill Community Garden

A productive plot growing vegetables for local communities, cafes and based at a local church.

October 2014 - Bonnie Dundee and the Dundee Urban Orchard Project, plant fruit trees in the planters at Dundee Science Centre.




Orchard City

DUO (Dundee Urban Orchard) is a city wide art project that supports individuals and community groups to plant and care for small-scale orchards within Dundee.

In addition to the practical benefits of enhancing biodiversity, reconnecting individuals and community groups to local greenspaces and raising awareness of where food comes from, DUO offer art workshops for all ages and experiences with a focus on sustainability.

In an urban environment like Dundee it's easy to lose connection to the food we eat. A large proportion of the food available in Dundee has travelled long distances and is purchased in packaged or processed form from supermarket shelves. Planting, caring for and harvesting an orchard go a long way to bridging this disconnect.

October 2014 - DUO celebrated Dundee as the world's first Orchard City. Between March 2013 and May 2015 DUO helped plant 24 orchards in Dundee, including Botanic Garden, Colleges, Hospital Garden, High Schools, Primary Schools, Community Gardens, Library, Wildlife Park, Churches and a Families House.



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WINTER

Community Garden Projects

Lochee Community Orchard

January/February/March 2015 - Saw the start of a two site project involving Dundee City Council and the Lochee Gardeners group. Lochee Community Garden and Orchard is an example of a community involved in planting session with DUO members.

This site was an unloved corner plot by a busy junction in Lochee. The Lochee Community Gardeners have taken on its maintenance. They want it to be used as a peaceful spot for relaxing and enjoying the wildlife and greenery. A wall-trained orchard has been planted in partnership with Dundee Urban Orchard. Local children helped to plant the trees and rare mining bees came to grab some of the soil.

The Lochee Community allotment was constructed by Dundee City Council as part of a £30,000 capital improvement project to Ancrum Road Allotments.

The Maxwell Centre Everyone's Garden

Dundee's Maxwell Centre was given a grant to run its community garden and environment project.

The scheme received a share of more than £3.6 million from the Scottish Government's Climate Challenge Fund announced by Minister for Environment and Climate Change, Paul Wheelhouse.

The garden gives the community the chance to grow fruit, vegetables and herbs and address air pollution, conservation and the sustainability of

food through learning and development opportunities.

Andy Finlay, a volunteer at the Maxwell Centre, said: "The funding from the Climate Challenge Fund, together with the funding we received from the Coldside Regeneration Forum provided the support and expertise to help us to develop an accessible, purpose-built area, to offer learning and volunteering opportunities within a garden and environmental area to the whole community."

Ninewells Community Garden and activities within the grounds

The development of this beautiful garden in the grounds of Ninewells Hospital has been progressing for the past 18 months. Volunteers do most of the work. The garden benefitted greatly from the help of the BBC Beechgrove Garden programme. In the 2014 Beautiful Scotland Awards, the garden won the David Welch award for something special.

February 2015 - Queen Street Garden, the group were back to plant out snowdrops and native

bluebells. One of their aims is to increase biodiversity so having native plants that will come up each spring is a good addition to their range. They also gained access to the stone shed on the site and that has been a great help to them.

February was a busy month as a small group came back to tackle the big job of installing a wildlife pond. Last year's CSV grant has covered the cost of the pond, landscaping and a wide selection of new wildflower

plugs. Most of which were planted out at the later spring event.

Later in the month the Nature Nutters, a group of young environmentalists, went along to help build a bug hotel (with contributions from Jewsons). The group also filled their new raised beds with compost donated by Dundee City Council ready for planting out some of last year's wildflowers grown from seed.

February 2015 - Broughty Ferry in Bloom Snow Drop In, fund raising activity involving plant sale, coffee morning and a display of snowdrops.



Environmental Activities

SPRING

May 2015 - Bioblitz at Trottick, "Bio Blitz" is a large scale event that engages people with biodiversity, inviting them to get directly involved in surveying and monitoring their local wildlife and green spaces. During a Bio Blitz event scientists and members of the public work together to survey a natural space; seeking, identifying and recording as many species as possible over 24 hours.



A BioBlitz is an unrivalled opportunity to bring people from all walks of life together, enabling them to discover and experience what nature has to offer. Another important aim of a BioBlitz is for the public to understand the diversity of wildlife living on their doorstep. It's an ideal opportunity to establish the degree of biodiversity within the site whilst giving everyone the chance to experience nature, learn, have fun, be inspired from experts and understand why wildlife recording is important.

A BioBlitz brings together adults and children from all backgrounds and expertise, as no existing

knowledge about nature or wildlife is needed to be able take part. Volunteers, students, naturalists, families, school groups and everyone in between can come along.

AUTUMN

City residents welcome food, waste and recycling service

Dundee City Council has begun the roll out of its major service change project to introduce a new collection service throughout the city providing opportunities for all households to recycle more materials at home such as food waste, plastic, metals, cans and glass. Collections go to a fortnightly residual waste collection instead of weekly. Phase one went live on 23 March 2015 and the process of rolling out Phase two is ongoing. There are four further phases.

Currently only 32% of household waste is recycled in Dundee. The new arrangements will allow all residents regardless of where they live or what type of property they live in to recycle more in a convenient way. It is anticipated that by implementing the changes, a target of recycling more than 50% of waste by 2018, will be met.

Larger items can be recycled at one of two Household Waste Recycling Centres at Riverside or Baldovie.

As well as encouraging local residents to recycle, Dundee City Council is introducing a number of reuse and waste reduction initiatives, shifting the focus from how Dundee's waste is dealt with to reducing the amount produced in the first place. Working in close partnership with local social enterprises, Dundee City Council is establishing a reuse hub at Baldovie Recycling Centre with the aim of reducing the amount of reusable electronic and household items going to waste in Dundee. This initiative will not only increase the availability of affordable household items but will further benefit local communities by providing training and employment opportunities for those working within the reuse hub. Furthermore, in line with widespread changes to domestic waste

collection services, Dundee City Council is rolling out an internal recycling service to all Council buildings including schools, offices, and leisure facilities in line with the major service change project timescales. With over 7000 employees, the new recycling policy will show Dundee City Council to be a leading example of a sustainable workplace.

WINTER

Discovery Compost is produced locally by Dundee City from the garden waste that residents put into their brown wheeled bins plus green waste produced from local parks and commercial landscapers.

Discovery Compost is certified to Publicly Available Specification 100 (PAS 100) standard which guarantees it is of a consistently high quality and is fit for purpose. The standard covers the entire composting process from the raw materials through to how the finished product is labelled and means producers know they are making a quality product and buyers know they are receiving quality compost.

The compost can be used as a peat-free soil conditioner, mulch or top soil substitute in domestic gardens and allotments or in larger scale projects such as commercial landscaping, agricultural uses and golf courses.

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Red Card for Pitch Litter

January 2015 - Footballers in Dundee parks are being urged to show the red card to pitch litter.

Dundee City Council and Zero Waste Scotland teamed up to deliver a new litter prevention project, working with local football teams, coaches, managers and supporters to reduce the amount of litter left after games in public parks.



The amount and types of litter at the pitches were recorded and there was a survey of players, managers, coaches, supporters and spectators about the issues. Following this initial investigation of the litter problems caused by plastic bottles and other items left around pitches, a new pilot project is being kicked off to try and raise awareness and cut down on weekend match litter.

Dundee City Council Environment Convener,

Councillor Craig Melville said: "This is a great way to engage with people who use our facilities week in and week out.

"We want to raise awareness of littering issues and ask players and supporters to leave the pitches and surrounding areas as clean as they can.

"As part of our wider push to increase Dundee's recycling rate, this is a simple and effective way to tackle litter and make sure that any plastic bottles are recycled and counted towards our total. I will be interested to see how this pilot works out.

"Parks and green spaces are there to be enjoyed by everyone in Dundee. I am keen that this campaign can highlight the role that people can play in keeping these areas clean."

Commenting on the launch of the project, lain Gulland, Chief Executive, Zero Waste Scotland, said: "Litter is a blight on communities across Scotland and no one knows that more than the people who live in them.

"That's why they, and we, are determined to tackle the problem with targeted actions, like this fantastic co-operative effort by football players, teams coaches and their families and supporters across Dundee, to raise awareness of the litter problem and try to keep the pitches, and the areas around them, litter-free, so that everyone can continue to enjoy their leisure time there."

The final phase will involve further litter monitoring to assess the impact of the project. If successful, the approach could be implemented in other areas of the city.

WARPit

Dundee City Council's innovative online resource-redistribution tool - WARPit (Waste Action Reuse Portal) makes it easy for staff to obtain surplus resources (e.g. furniture, equipment, electrical items, office consumables, stationery, and technical equipment) within Dundee City Council and beyond, reducing procurement spend and waste disposal costs, as well as minimising waste and reducing carbon emissions.

By pioneering online resource reuse and creating a regional sharing network, WARPit has already helped Dundee City Council divert 20 tonnes of waste, saved 54 tonnes of CO2 and saved the Council and its partners almost £130,000 in avoided procurement costs, contributing to the Scottish Government's vision for a zero waste society while also delivering a number of wider community benefits.

WARPit goes beyond economic and environmental benefits to deliver real community results:

- Housing Officers taking furniture for new community spaces in regeneration areas
- Schools reusing display boards, chairs, bookcases for their libraries
- Social Workers sourcing café equipment and sofas for family support meeting rooms
- Foodbanks fitting out new offices from our surplus resources.

The WARPit project has won a Scottish Green Apple GOLD Award, UK Green Apple Award, CIWM Scottish Resource Award, Zero Waste BRONZE Award and was a finalist in the 2014 Association for Public Service Excellence UK Awards and Government Opportunities (GO) Excellence in Public Procurement Awards.



Jan 2015 - Beach Information

Broughty Ferry has a fantastic sandy Resort Award winning beach. In the winter the beach becomes a haven for migrating waders. Local people are involved with beach clean ups as part of Broughty in Bloom. Broughty Ferry Environmental Project have carried out wildlife surveys and restored dunes. Countryside Rangers lead school groups using the beach for nature study. Dolphins can often be seen in the Tay from the beach. The Esplande runs alongside the sand dunes past an artificial sand martin nesting bank. Ten new enclosed bins at a cost of \$8,000 have been installed and ten more have been ordered for the Esplanade and harbour area.

Engineers have received planning permission for an additional 850 metres of rock armour from Bridge Street up to Monifieth, funded from a Scottish Government grant. Work was undertaken due to the severe weather conditions last winter which had caused damage to the timber access, these are to be repaired in July, the work should be complete by the end of September, including 75 metre of Rock Armour. The pathway to the beach will be formalised and work will only take place at certain tide levels, to protect the wading birds. Broughty Ferry Beach is a Site of Special Scientific Interest and does not get mechanically cleaned over the winter period, to protect feeding wading birds.

Volunteers from the Broughty Ferry Beach Management Group, Dundee & Angus Zero Waste Group, Marine Conservation Scociety, Broughty Ferry in Bloom Group and other volunteers complete regular clean ups, throughout the year through the Dundee Clean up Scotland Events calendar.
