1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To inform the committee of the transition support plan for The Helm organisation within the context of savings from financial year 2021/22

2.0 **RECOMMENDATIONS**

2.1 It is recommended that the proposed transition support plan and saving described in this report is considered by the committee as potential savings in financial year 2021/22 and future years.

3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 The implementation of the following proposal would result in a part-year saving in 2021/22 of £129,000 and a full year saving of £214,000 in following years.

4.0 MAIN TEXT

- 4.1 The Helm forms one of the options within the Off-Site Education Service and complements the option of PACE, aimed at young people in S4 who have significant barriers to engaging with school. Helm Training Ltd works in partnership with the Children & Families Service to provide a service for young people in their last year of secondary school who require targeted intervention which promotes their skills for learning, life and work; and enables them to achieve a positive post-school destination.
- 4.2 Dundee City Council provides a financial contribution of £214,000 to HELM. The provision uses a holistic person-centred approach, designed to suit individual needs and pace, maximise engagement and linked to the attainment of positive destinations. There are 25 places. Outcomes for young people attending Helm are positive in relation to their attendance, engagement and positive destinations on leaving school. However, in responding to the needs and potential risks for young people in transition post-school, a different partnership with Helm Training Ltd is required which strengthens the pathway for employability.
- 4.3 Discussions have taken place in the last year with the Helm Board and DCC contracts and service managers in relation to the reshaping of the partnership and removal of the funding. The Children and Families Service have discussed with Helm the option for them to join the Children and Families Support Framework and this suggestion was positively received. The Helm manager has shared their future business plans with us having scoped the need for transition support for targeted young people leaving school and care. Due to the prevailing COVID -19 situation there are no plans to offer new places at HELM between January 2021 and June 2021.Some young people will still require targeted support with those they have relationships with at the Helm to support their transition beyond school. This is likely to include young people who may also be leaving care. Part year funding of £85,000 will continue from April until August 2021 with Helm to allow this support to be provided.
- 4.4 This single year part year funding will also assist HELM in bridging to a new business model partly through the Dundee Children and Families Support Framework

4.5 In order to manage the longer-term risk of reduction in support for young people who would no longer attend the Helm, planning is well underway with D&A College to explore how additional capacity could be made by building on the success of PACE. All overhead costs will continue to be met by the college. This provision is planned to be in place for August 2021 dependent on COVID-19 factors.
