1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To inform committee of the forthcoming exhibition "JOSEPH McKENZIE: HAWKHILL - Death of a Living Community" and its supporting programme.

2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 The estimated cost of mounting the exhibition is £6,000 which can be met from the Leisure and Arts Department's Revenue Budget for 2004/2005.

4.1 The project supports the principles: "opportunities for culture, leisure and recreation are available to all" and "access to the skills, knowledge and information needed to enable everyone to play a full part in society".

6.0 MAIN TEXT

- This photography exhibition will run in the McManus Galleries from Saturday 2 April to Sunday 12 June 2005.
- Joseph McKenzie, born London in 1929, was Lecturer in Photography at Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art from 1964 until 1986. Regarded by many as the 'Father of Modern Scottish Photography', he produced several major studies in the 1960's which were shown in art galleries across Scotland. In 1990 the McManus Galleries acquired (part gift / part purchase) the major study, "DUNDEE: City in Transition, 1964-1966" selections from which are regularly displayed.
- 6.3 This exhibition has been triggered by a recent very generous gift from the artist of 448 superb vintage prints from his most focused and analytical study, "Hawkhill: Death of a Living Community, 1965/1981". He described it "as a gift (I hope priceless) in a handing back to the people of Dundee."
- 6.4 130 of these black and white prints will be framed up for display while 60 other images, including the essay on "Mrs Wallace's Pie Shop", will be shown on a plasma screen.

- The theme of the exhibition is the old Hawkhill area at a time of great upheaval when whole streets of tenements, cottages, trees and gardens were being demolished. Apart from images of ruins and dereliction, there are photographs of the families still living there or people passing through. As usual with McKenzie, there are delightful portraits of children and old people.
- 6.6 The Events Programme.

One 'Meet the Photographer' session is scheduled for Tuesday 12 April at 1am. Other projected events include a 'reminiscence group' meeting of people who used to live in the Hawkhill area and special guided tours for photography students.
