## 1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To seek approval for the Community Safety Strategy 2009 - 2012 and Action Plan 1 April 2009 - 31 March 2010 (see Appendices 1 and 2).

#### 2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that the Committee

- 2.1 approve the Community Safety Strategy 2009 2012 and Action Plan 1 April 2009 31 March 2010 (Year 1).
- 2.2 approve the establishment of a single commissioning budget for the Dundee Community Safety Partnership by combining the Local Action Fund and the commissioning budget contained within the Community Safety Award.
- 2.3 approve the funding proposals as outlined in Appendix 3 of this report.
- 2.4 note that the Community Safety Action Plan will be reviewed in October 2009 in line with all the other Single Outcome Agreement Delivery Plans.

## 3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 3.1 Following the end of Scottish Government external funding for Community Safety activities, community safety monies have now been mainstreamed into Dundee City Council's allocation as per the Concordat agreed between Local Authorities and the Scottish Government.
- 3.2 Mainstreamed Community Safety Funding as per the Community Safety Award and Local Action Fund is necessary to meet the objectives outlined within the Community Safety Strategy 2009 2012 and in particular to achieve Dundee's aim of creating a city where "Our communities will be safe and feel safe".

## 4.0 MAIN TEXT

4.1 The Community Safety Strategy 2009 - 2012 builds upon the strategy 2005 - 2010 which was reported to Committee on the 21 August 2006, Report No: 437/2006 refers.

- 4.2 For the first time and in line with national guidelines and best practise, Dundee Community Safety Partnership have based their key strategic priorities upon the Strategic Assessment compiled by the Community Intelligence Unit based within Tayside Police. The Strategic Assessment pulls together a range of information from Partners. This information is then analysed and this allows the priorities to be determined based upon evidence.
- 4.3 The key priorities within the Community Safety Strategy 2009 2012 are:
  - a. Reduce crimes groups 1 4 (See Item 3.1 in Appendix 1)
  - b. Feeling safer
  - c. Reduce wilful fire-raising
  - d. Community tension and counter terrorism
  - e. Prostitution
  - f. Home safety/accident prevention
  - g. Substance Misuse
  - h. Partnership working
- Dundee Community Safety Partnership has agreed to undertake activities on behalf of the Dundee Partnership in relation to the Single Outcome Agreement and in particular National Outcome 9 ' We live or lives free from Crime, Disorder and Danger'. This undertaking is reflected within the Community Safety Strategy 2009 2012.

#### 5.0 POLICY IMPLICATIONS

5.1 This report has been screened for any policy implications in respect of Sustainability, Strategic Environmental Assessment, Anti-Poverty, Equality Impact Assessment and Risk Management.

There are no major issues.

## **Dundee Community Safety Partnership Strategy 2009 - 2012**

## And Action Plan 2009 - 2010 (Year 1)

## 1.0 CONTENT

- 1.1 The Community Plan for Dundee 2005 2010 identifies Community Safety as a key theme and has remitted the co-ordination of activities supporting the strategic priorities within this theme, to the Dundee Community Safety Partnership. The Partnership is a constituted body composed of a wide range of statutory and voluntary organisations who have in whole or in part, the development of community safety issues within their core remits.
- 1.2 Dundee City Council Plan 2007 2011 also identifies Community Safety as a key theme with its principal objective to create a city where crime is reducing and where people are safe and feel safe.
- 1.3 The Single Outcome Agreement between Dundee City Council and the Scottish Government identified as a Strategic Outcome on behalf of the Dundee Partnership that "Our communities will be safe and feel safe". Dundee Community Safety Partnership has been remitted with the co-ordination of activities supporting the indicators within this outcome. These are to:
  - Reduce Crime (groups 1 4)
  - Increase the percentage of those who state that fear of crime has no effect on their quality of life.
- 1.4 The Partnership realises that community safety can be widely interpreted in its definition. For the first time, and in line with nationally recognised best practice, the Partnership primary strategic objectives are based on the outcome of a Strategic Assessment. This document has drawn together available intelligence from a range of partners. Analysis of the intelligence has determined these objectives which also appear within the Single Outcome Agreement. The Action Plans identify the key actions which the Partner organisations will commit to. They do not represent the totality of individual Partner organisations work within community safety.
- 1.5 The Partnership has also indicated its intention to study the implications of the Anti-social Behaviour Review (March 2009) and report its conclusions and recommendations on the way forward in Dundee.

## 2.0 STRATEGIC OUTCOMES

2.1 The Dundee Partnerships' overarching strategic outcome is "to create a city where our communities will be safe and feel safe"

# 3.0 INTERMEDIATE OUTCOMES (ABOVE THE SINGLE OUTCOME AGREEMENT WATERLINE)

## 3.1 REDUCE CRIMES (GROUPS 1 - 4)

For the past several years the number of crimes committed within Dundee has continued to fall whilst the detection rate has continued to increase. Crime is not an issue that can be tackled by the police alone but requires a co-ordinated approach by communities and all partners. Such co-operation and joined up working will ensure that the crime trends continue to move in the right direction whereby crimes continue to fall and the amount of offenders being detected continues to rise.

To that end the partnership will continue to ensure that group 1-4 crimes, namely Crimes of Violence (Group 1), Crimes of Indecency (Group 2), crimes of Dishonesty (Group 3) and Group 4 crimes such as Fire-Raising and Malicious and Reckless Conduct are rigorously pursued and prevention measures are put into place.

## Priorities for action

- To increase community intelligence to assist in the preventing and detection of crimes
- > To use all available intelligence to identify crime trends and act to prevent them and detect offenders
- > To continue the year on year reduction in crime
- > To continue the year on year increase in detection of crime.
- > To support efforts to address the causes of crime.
- > To work with Tayside Community Justice Authority and other partners to reduce re-offending

# 3.2 INCREASE THE PERCENTAGE OF THOSE WHO STATE THAT FEAR OF CRIME HAS NO EFFECT ON THEIR QUALITY OF LIFE.

Although the trend for crime in Dundee is downwards over the last three years, this is not reflected as we would hope in the perceptions of people's fear of crime. The Partnership is committed therefore to working closely with Local Community Planning Partnerships and others and encourage communities willingness to participate in community safety activities, to grow in confidence and to remain active in the task of making sure their areas are safe and attractive for everyone.

## Priorities for action:

- Use all available intelligence to identify hotspots to make best use of mobile and other CCTV, Community Safety Wardens and antisocial behaviour intelligence.
- Identify and target crime hotspots by focussed community policing.
- > Support involvement of local communities to address community safety issues.
- > Support victims of crime and antisocial behaviour.
- > Undertake target hardening of properties deemed to be vulnerable.
- Target Local Action Fund commissioning to tackle antisocial behaviour hotspots.

## 4.0 SUPPORTING OUTCOMES (Below Single Outcome Agreement Waterline)

#### 4.1 REDUCE WILFUL FIRE-RAISING

Wilful fire-raising is often opportunistic by nature and successful partnership working has been instrumental in tackling some of the underlying causes such as fly tipping, poor presentation of waste and access to derelict properties.

## Priorities for action:

- Continue targeted partnership working on key issues through the Antisocial Related Fire Sub-Group of the Partnership.
- > Promote targeted young fire-fighter programmes.
- > Further develop secondment opportunities to enhance co-working.

## 4.2 COMMUNITY TENSION AND COUNTER TERRORISM

The terrorist threat facing the UK remains diverse, not only from Al Qaeda and those associated and inspired by them, but from British and foreign citizens of varied ethnic and national backgrounds - from those known and those yet to be identified.

The Government's have developed the CONTEST strategy aimed at developing a community-led response to terrorism and the four strands of the strategy; Prevent, Pursue, Protect and Prepare, detail the work being carried out to achieve this. A priority of the strategy is to identify, prevent, isolate and contain radicalisation at an early stage.

## Priorities for action:

To reduce the overall risk of terrorism by:

- Protecting and preparing the community in order to reduce vulnerability
- Reducing the threat to the community by pursuing extremists and preventing an attack

## 4.3 ON- STREET PROSTITUTION

There are strong link between the involvement of women in on-street prostitution, substance misuse and sexual violence particularly childhood sexual abuse. Local intelligence suggests that women involved in on-street prostitution are predominantly drawn from the Dundee City area and are seeking to fund their, and often their partners, substance use. Dundee received £200,000 from the Scottish Government to tackle on street prostitution. A member of staff has been appointed for one year to co-ordinate activities to tackle this issue. Tayside Police, NHS Tayside, the Dundee Violence Against Women Partnership and Action for Children are key partners in addressing this issue and efforts will be made to maximise funding opportunities by developing partnership links.

#### Priorities for action:

These are restricted by the Scottish Government funding to:

- Challenging attitudes which lead to a demand for prostitution
- Preventing vulnerable young people from becoming involved in prostitution
- Minimising the harm and risk encountered by women who are involved in street prostitution
- Assisting women to leave prostitution
- Enforcing the law, disrupting street sex markets and protecting communities affected by the presence of street prostitution

## 4.4 HOME SAFETY/ACCIDENT PREVENTION

It is widely acknowledged that significant numbers of accidents occur in the home and that pre-school children and older people are the high risk groups. Dundee City Council, Tayside Fire and Rescue Service and the NHS are the key partners in addressing this issue. It is recognised that alcohol is a significant risk factor in this and the Community Safety Partnership is committed to working in partnership with the Alcohol and Drugs Partnership and others to address these issues.

## Priorities for action:

- Promote educational opportunities within the community.
- Increase numbers of home safety visits and home fire safety visits.
- Link to national campaigns for increased publicity and awareness.
- Work with the NHS to collate appropriate statistics.
- > Develop joint strategies to address the issues.
- Support initiatives designed to reduce alcohol consumption

## 4.5 SUBSTANCE MISUSE

The effects of substance misuse are evident in many areas of Dundee and the Community Safety Partnership is committed to working with partners to address the issues.

#### Priorities for action:

- > Develop strategically targeted diversionary activity and access to support for young people.
- > Ensure co-ordinated approach by all partners to identify priorities and appropriate actions.
- Seek to align partner resources to Dundee priorities.

## 4.6 PARTNERSHIP WORKING

Partnership working is key to achieving our objective "to create a city where our communities will be safe and feel safe". The Partnership will take every opportunity to link into both local and national partnerships and networks to achieve a high quality of service for those who live and work in Dundee

## Priorities for action:

- ➤ Ensure strong links with Local Community Planning Partnerships to reduce offending in communities.
- > Develop an effective community engagement strategy.
- > Contribute to local and national strategic debate and practise.
- > Further enhance data sharing and service delivery protocols.
- Ensure commissioning of Community Safety Award and Local Action Fund monies to meet Partnership objectives and priorities.
- Confirm mainstreaming arrangements for Community Safety activity.
- Link strategically with other partnerships e.g. Alcohol and Drugs Partnership, Community Justice Authority to ensure combined resources are appropriately targeted to shared aims.
- > To engage with emergency planning to ensure readiness for emergency situations.
