#### 1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To seek approval for the Community Safety Partnership Action Plan 2010 - 2012, 2011 -2012 Update, the Community Safety Partnership Commissioning Budget 2011 - 2012 and the Local Action Fund Commissioning Budget 2011 -2012.

#### 2.0 RECOMMENDATION

- 2.2 Approve the Community Safety Partnership Commissioning Budget/Local Action Fund 2011-2012 (appendix 2).
- 2.3 Note that the Community Safety Partnership Action Plan will be reviewed in April 2012.
- 2.4 Note that the Community Safety Action Plan 2010 2012 was approved by Committee on 26 April 2010. Report No. 208-2010 refers.

### 3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 3.1 Funding is available for both the Community Safety Partnership and Local Action Fund Commissioning Budgets within the Leisure and Communities Budget 2011 2012.
- 3.2 This funding is required to meet the Community Safety Partnership commitment on behalf of the Dundee Partnership to meet the objectives outlined within the Community Safety Strategy 2009 2012 (agreed by Committee on 27 April 2009. Report No. 205-2009 refers). Specifically, it is required to achieve Dundee's aim of creating a city where "Our communities will be safe and feel safe".

### 4.0 MAIN TEXT

- 4.1 The Community Safety Partnership Action Plan 2011 2012 update builds upon the work undertaken in year 1 of the 2010 2012 Action Plan and reflects the revised priorities in the 2011 Strategic Assessment. It aims to create a synergy between other Action Plans, principally those of the Alcohol and Drugs Partnership and the Community Justice Authority.
- 4.2 The Action Plan reflects the Community Safety Partnership's role in the delivery of Dundee's Single Outcome Agreement.

4.3 Monitoring of the Action Plan is undertaken by the Community safety Partnership's Strategic Information, Monitoring and Evaluation Group and reflects a range of qualitative and quantitative indicators.

#### 5.0 POLICY IMPLICATIONS
