1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 The purpose of this report is to set out proposed changes to third party payments administered by Neighbourhood Services. Approval is sought to introduce these changes for 2023/24.

2 RECOMMENDATION

2.1. It is recommended that Committee approves the level to third party payments set out in Section 4 of the report and summarised at 4.7.

3 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 The changes set out in this report generate savings of £159,000 on third party payments administered by Neighbourhood Services.

4.0 MAIN TEXT

- 4.1 The Communities team provides third party payments to Grey Lodge Settlement (£56,000) and to Dundee Volunteer and Voluntary Action (DVVA) (£68,000). The Community Safety and Resilience Team contribute to the cost of a Police Scotland Community Analyst (£25,000) and have a provision of £19,000 in its commissioning budget for projects that help deliver on our community safety priorities.
- 4.2 At present DCC contributes to the overall cost of these services, but many community organisations have access to other sources of external funding. Third sector organisations have charitable status and are eligible to apply for external funding through grant aid and relevant trusts.
- 4.3 Grey Lodge Settlement operates as a multi-functional community development organisation to work in partnership with other agencies to provide a range of locally based services. It provides opportunities and activities for young people and young adults, with an emphasis on mental health and wellbeing. It supports volunteering among young people and provides activities for older people. DCC currently provides funding of £56,000. It is proposed this funding is withdrawn. Grey Lodge have significant reserves, therefore should be able to absorb this whilst seeking alternative funding.
- Dundee Volunteer and Voluntary Action (DVVA), alongside Dundee Social Enterprise Network (DSEN) form the Third Sector Interface (TSI) for Dundee. TSIs are established in each Local Authority area in Scotland to be the voice of the Third Sector in local community planning and are funded to carry out this role by Scotlish Government. DCC currently provides funding of £68,000. It is proposed that this funding is withdrawn. DVVA have significant reserves.
- 4.5 The Community Safety and Resilience Team provide a third-party payment to Police Scotland that contributes to the cost of a Community Analyst. Analytical reports are provided for Committees, Executive Boards, and sub-groups such as the Fire- Related ASB forum and local Multi-agency Tasking and Coordination (MATAC) meetings. It is recommended that this funding is withdrawn. Existing sources of statistical information will be used for reporting purposes to, for example, the Community Safety and Justice Executive Board.
- 4.6 The Community Safety commissioning budget is used to support the work of partners to achieve related objectives set out in the City Plan. Examples include a contribution to the running of the

Safe Zone bus, property security strengthening for the victims of crime and a contribution to WRASAC's costs associated with the 16 Days of Activism. The current budget is £19,000. It is proposed to reduce this by £10,000.

4.7 In summary, the withdrawal of funding currently provided to Grey Lodge (£56,000), DVVA (£68,000) and Police Scotland (£25,000) and the reduction of the Community Safety commissioning budget (by £10,000) will generate a saving of £159,000 for the 2023/24 Neighbourhood Services revenue budget.

5.0 POLICY IMPLICATIONS

5.1 This report has been subject to an Integrated Impact Assessment to identify impacts on Equality & Diversity, Fairness & Poverty, Environment and Corporate Risk.
