1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 This report presents the current position of the Cost of the School Day (COSD) project in schools across Dundee.

2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 It is recommended that Committee note the terms of this report.

3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 There are no financial implications.

4.0 BACKGROUND

- 4.1 Dundee City Council and the Dundee Partnership adopted the revised Fairness Action Plan for Dundee in November 2016 (Article IV of the Minute of the Policy and Resources Committee on 14 November 2016 refers). Building on the recommendations of the Dundee Fairness Commission, one of the priority outcomes related to Closing the Education Gap.
- 4.2 The Children and Families Service has made a clear and strong commitment to tackling poverty and its impact on the lives and attainment of children and young people in Dundee. Many of these are directly reducing costs for pupils and parents while also improving health & wellbeing, literacy and numeracy. The work of the Scottish Attainment Challenge is the most visible additional investment in better outcomes and this is augmented by the significant contribution made in each school through poverty related activity being funded and implemented through the Pupil Equity Fund to support closing the attainment gap.
- 4.3 In October 2016, the Scottish Government published its new Fairer Scotland Action Plan. This included a pledge by the Dundee Partnership and Dundee City Council to commission joint work with the Child Poverty Action Group (CPAG) Scotland to facilitate a Cost of the School Day initiative during the 2016/17 year. CPAG worked with pupils, parents and teachers to identify and remove key cost barriers so that all children and young people from low income households can fully engage in their education.
- 4.4 Taking account of the work of the project team each school in the city reviewed the needs of children and young people facing cost barriers to participation in school. This has included work with children and young people, parents and carers and wider partnerships.
- 4.5 In order to enable the project to work in all schools and to put in place practical responses to the challenges identified in the research, the Cost of the School Day project received a further year's funding through Scottish Attainment Challenge funding. This enabled schools to build on the momentum achieved in the first phase of this initiative and follow through on the range of activities already underway through the Pupil Equity Fund. Schools have now worked on a Cost of the School Day Action Plan and have identified a Cost of the School Day lead. Support was offered through Practice Network Meetings and a series of shared practice documents have been produced.

No child or young person in Dundee will start school without a breakfast

- No child in Dundee will miss out on their Primary 7 residential trip due to cost
- All schools will develop a Cost of the School Day action plan by the end of session 2018/2019
- All children and young people in Dundee schools will have access to an affordable school uniform
- 4.7 The Scottish Attainment Challenge funded Cost of the School Day project ended in March 2020. A final Cost of the School Day Guidance was completed and shared with all schools. This guidance is intended to give all Dundee schools a clear understanding of what is expected of them in delivering Cost of the School Day and what support is provided by Children and Families Service. A steering group of representatives from Early Years, Primary and Secondary sectors, the Active Schools Manager and a Service Manager from the Chief Executive department meet to ensure a focus remains on tackling poverty inequalities associated with school. This group is chaired by an Education Officer. A Newsletter highlighting successful practice and national updates is produced each term. - 4.8 All schools have a Cost of the School Day Action Plan. These plans amount to over 200 interventions addressing cost barriers. Examples from school action plans include cheaper uniform suppliers, more inclusive homework policies, greater consistency in lending resources, breakfast provision, free 'ready to learn' packs, non-stigmatising approaches to fundraising, trip subsidies, improved promotion of financial entitlements and many more. (Appendix 1).
- 4.9 Children and Families Service, working in partnership with Active Schools as part of their commitment to the Cost of the School day, have made a further commitment to children and their families to reduce barriers to participation in wider opportunities by removing any costs associated with school sport or physical activity clubs (at the point of participation), which take place before school, at lunch times or after school.

This came in to force last session but Covid-19 restrictions means that the delivery of sporting activities in school has been disrupted but going forward there is a commitment to no charge for activities during the school day. Any new sport or physical activity clubs being introduced before school, at lunchtime or after school should not incur any charge going forward. Schools can choose to recruit volunteers, apply for funding or use school funds to reduce costs. Where the school is not in a position to pick up the cost associated with the activity, the partner organisation working with the school will be asked to schedule the activity after 5pm.

- 4.10 Cost of the School Day and poverty awareness is now included in the Children & Families Service Equalities Briefing which is delivered by Headteachers to all school staff at the start of session. The section specific to Cost of the School Day was prepared by the Cost of The School Day Support Officers, highlighting the extent of child poverty in Dundee and reminding all staff of the importance of reducing the costs associated to school for families. In addition, all school staff are encouraged to complete an e-learning module (<u>https://elearning.cpag.org.uk/course/view.php?id=34)</u> which was also developed for Dundee by colleagues at the Child Poverty Action Group.
- 4.11 The pandemic and the partial closure of schools in early 2021 saw schools endeavour to ensure that all pupils were able to access learning. Where IT was an issue some schools allowed families to borrow hardware whilst others distributed re-conditioned laptops and tablets. 3rd sector partners supported in a similar way by donating tablets, laptops and data packages. If accessing IT was not possible home learning packs were distributed by school

staff. Regular food parcels were delivered where necessary whilst teachers and support staff maintained regular contact with families offering a variety of support. Schools used their own social media (e.g.Twitter and School App) to update families and remind them of grant application deadlines. Appendix 2 gives an example of what one secondary school did.

4.12 Some Dundee families and young people responded to CPAG's 'The Cost of Learning in Lockdown' survey (https://cpag.org.uk/policy-and-campaigns/report/cost-learning-lockdown-family-experiencesschool-closures) Positive comments from the report, with regard to Free School Meals and having regular contact with schools include:

"I can buy food from anywhere for them because I am not restricted in any way of how and where I spend the money. I can make a little go a long way." (Lone parent of three children, Dundee)

"No extra expense travelling to receive meal or [spend] voucher. Also stops others knowing and saves my child embarrassment." (Mum of young man aged 16, Dundee) "Primary school's family support worker set up a family support page on Facebook to share information, and check in, it's been great to see that we are not alone." (Mum of three children, Dundee)

- 4.13 This session, the Scottish Government expanded the provision of free school meals for Primary School pupils. From the start of term in August 2021 all P1 – P4 pupils had the option of a free, healthy school meal. Between August and December 2021 over 60% of pupils in P1 – P4 took up this offer. Since 6th January 2022, P5 pupils have been the given the option of a free school lunch. In addition, during school holiday periods Dundee City Council continues to make direct payments to all families eligible for Free School Meals. School and Family Development workers in school play a critical role in ensuring families are aware of these benefits.
- 4.14 As a result of Dundee City Council streamlining processes eligible families in receipt of Housing Benefit or Council Tax reduction are now automatically awarded the school clothing grant and no longer need to fill in a new application form each year. Schools continue to actively publicise the grants and benefits that families can access in an effort to ensure barriers to education are minimised.
- 4.15 Local authority led Early Years establishments in Dundee are no longer required to submit Cost of the School day Action Plans as collectively they have worked to reduce all additional costs associated with learning in the nursery.
- 4.16 Dundee schools continue to work with Dundee Bairns to support families. Schools have accessed funding from the 'Cosy Bairns' initiative, food vouchers, Family Tea Clubs and Dundee Bairns funded Ardler Primary Family healthy cooking sessions.
- 4.17 The continuation of the Young Scot Attain Funding has allowed free bus travel to continue for vulnerable groups of secondary school pupils. This has enabled them to get to school at no additional cost as well as being able to access leisure activities at the end of the day. The funding will remain in place until the Scottish Government free travel for under 22s is launched.
- 4.18 The Child Poverty Action Group (Scotland) continues to take an interest in the Cost of the School Day work in Dundee schools. In November 2021 a number of school staff attended CLPL sessions for the Tayside Regional Collaborative organised by CPAG and Education Scotland. In addition to this, Ardler Primary School and Balgay Hill Nursery presented examples of work they are currently undertaking to support families reduce costs. Ardler Primary School's project also featured in Education Scotland's National Improvement Hub Equality and Equity toolkit. Connect Equality and Equity toolkit
- 4.19 Two short films have been produced featuring the staff and pupils at Downfield and Rosebank Primaries. The films showcase how the schools manage to recognise national awareness days like World Book day without adding financial pressure to families. They can be accessed here: <u>Downfield Primary School</u> and <u>Rosebank Primary School</u>. The lead Education

Officer was asked write a blog piece for the CPAG website, highlighting what was working well in Dundee schools.

APPENDIX 2

Morgan Matters

At the beginning of January we were conscious that those who needed access to period equality products may find this difficult. Although the school building was open, getting here to collect items might be challenging for some. We devised an on-line order form to try to address this.

Since last summer, we had been trying to make sure that all pupils had access to a suitable device to allow them to engage in on-line learning. The provision of new machines by the Scottish Government supplemented our provision of netbooks which were not currently being used in school. Families did begin to approach us in numbers by email now to say that they needed a laptop. We also added IT provision to our order form, with dongles and data cards also available.



We added stationery items to this form, understanding that some families would not have all the required items at their disposal. We had also been given toiletries by Dundee Bairns at the beginning of the session and wanted to include these items too.

Our Pupil Support Team delivered the cosy PE kits that had been gifted by the Cosy Bairns project. We had also been given extra sweatshirts to keep pupils warm in school. We offered these as part of our on-line order too, along with other items of donated warm clothing.

We now have a Cycle Hub in school and one of our Pupil Support Workers has been working with classes to upcycle bicycles. Some of these bikes were nearly ready to go out for use. There were others waiting to find good homes. So bikes became part of our order form too!

To date we have had more than seventy-five on-line requests for these items, in various combinations. These have been delivered to families or collected from the school. We also set out supplies that could be collected without being ordered, so that those who wished to remain anonymous could collect what they needed from the foyer.

Food vouchers were made available directly supported 32 children. We pupils in school needing breakfast as idea form one of our associated families who came to collect laptops



for our most vulnerable families by Dundee Bairns, who had supported these folks at Christmas too. This diverted some of our Breakfast Club funds to supplement this for more families: there were not as many had been budgeted for. A further 50 children were directly supported in this way. We then borrowed an Primary Schools and started a Give and Take table, which was added to supplies in our foyer. Several or other resources went away with food to supplement their weekly shop.

As more pupils were invited into school with changing restrictions, we discovered that some had outgrown uniform. They did not want to attend without the proper clothing but purchasing said items was proving to be difficult. So we added uniform to our order form.

Our EAL service arranged interpreters to call families where the adults might not have sufficient English to support pupils engaging in online learning when concern was expressed by our PTs Guidance. This led to general well-being conversations and further requests for items from families who had not accessed the online form.

We hope that by being as flexible as possible and asking families what they required we have been able to support our community through this difficult time and minimise the cost of the school day whether that takes place in the building or at home.
