1. **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

1.1 This report recommends two year funding allocations to 23 Dundee Partnership projects, although the 2nd year is only provisionally set out pending our budget settlement for 2017/18. For 2016/17 the funding for 22 projects continues at the same level as previously awarded.

2. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- 2.1 It is recommended that Committee:
 - a) approves the two year allocations of funding to the organisations/projects set out in appendix 1.
 - b) agrees to the preparation and implementation of improvement plans for Mill O'Mains Pavillion and Save by the Bell prior to the confirmation of funding for 2017/18
 - c) agrees to the allocation of a one year allocation to Art Angel and remits any future funding reviews to the Integration Joint Board of the Health and Social Care Partnership.
 - c) agrees the reduced funding allocation of £29,027 to Dundee North Law Centre for the years 2016/17 and 2017/18.

3. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 This report recommends revenue allocations amounting to £1,610,589 for the years 2016/17 and 2017/18 from across Chief Executive's Services, Neighbourhood Services and Children and Families Services. These proposals represent savings of £153,392 for the year 2016/17 and thereafter.

4. BACKGROUND

4.1 <u>Strategic Funding Partnership with Third sector</u>

- 4.1.1 The Third Sector Strategic Funding Partnership was formed in 2014 to develop joint approaches for reaching funding decisions. From this a scoring and assessment framework was developed to establish future funding priorities for Dundee Partnership projects. A group of twenty three projects/organisations were identified which received a total of £1,763,981 in 2015/16.
- 4.1.2 All projects were invited to apply for up to their current levels of funding for the next two financial years. Following detailed assessment of these applications, it is proposed that projects receive the allocations set out in appendix 1. These are at the current levels of funding for all projects with the following exceptions:
 - a) Art Angel this community based mental health project also receives funding from NHS Tayside should be more closely aligned with health and social care provision. It is recommended that one year is allocated and then future funding is considered by the Integrated Joint Board as part of its longer term commissioning plans.
 - b) Mill O'Mains Pavillion it is proposed that one year funding is allocation with the year 2017/18 subject to the preparation and implementation of an improvement plan addressing aspects of project governance and management arrangements.
 - c) Save by the Bell it is proposed that one year funding is allocation with the year 2017/18 subject to the preparation and implementation of an improvement plan addressing aspects of project governance, management arrangements and targeting of activity.

- d) Dundee North Law Centre this organisation has been particularly successful in attracting significant external funding from other sources, including Legal Aid. As a result, this project is able to meet the majority of its costs for the next two years from healthy levels of unrestricted reserves. It is proposed that a reduced allocation of £29,027 for 2016/17 and 2017/18 is allocated to the project to enable it to introduce a new service to financially excluded people from Dundee delivered in partnership with Perth Prison.
- 4.1.3 A summary of the services to be provided by these projects and organisations is outlined in appendix 1.

5. **POLICY IMPLICATIONS**

This report has been screened for any policy implications in respect of Sustainability, Strategic Environmental Assessment, Anti-Poverty, Equality and Impact Assessment and Risk Management. The projects recommended for funding will all make positive contributions to city-wide efforts to tackle and reduce poverty, deprivation and stigma in Dundee.
