1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To seek approval to undertake improvements to the Green Circular and Core Path network.

2.0 RECOMMENDATION

2.1 It is recommended that the committee approves the improvement works and authorise the City Engineer to arrange for this work to be undertaken via the Roads Maintenance Partnership with Tayside Contracts.

3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 The Director of Corporate Services advises that the costs of £63,668.72 can be met from allowances within the 2013/14 capital plan for Environmental/Paths for All and from funding agreed from the Sustrans Community Links fund to 50% of costs to a maximum of £30,000 for this project.

4.0 BACKGROUND

- 4.1 Reference is made to Article III of the Environment Committee of 29th October 2012 when approval was given for Dundee Outdoor Access Strategy 2012-2017.
- 4.2 The Green Circular walking and cycle route runs for 26 miles around the city and is highly regarded as an important local and regional asset in the promotion of leisure and active travel. Sections of the route are included within the Sustrans National Cycle Network. In addition Dundee has a network of Core Paths throughout the city and the Land Reform (Scotland) Act requires that Core Paths are kept open and promoted.
- 4.3 Following a recent survey, improvements have been prioritised to be undertaken this year in reinstating a section of the Green Circular at Balmuir near Trottick which was damaged by the flooding in December 2012. A section of the Core Path eroded by storm water in the same area at Balmuir will also be improved forming a cycle path link from the Green Circular to the housing at William Fitzgerald Way. The surface will be finished with bitumous macadam to reduce future maintenance costs.
- 4.4 The proposed works are to be carried out in line with the Outdoor Access Strategy and Core Path Plan and to national cycleway standards.
- 4.5 The Chief Executive approved these works to be undertaken through the Road Maintenance Partnership with Tayside Contracts and a quotation of £63,668.72 has been received from Tayside Contracts for this work.

5.0 POLICY IMPLICATIONS

5.1 This Report has been screened for any policy implications in respect of Sustainability, Strategic Environmental Assessment, Anti-Poverty, Equality Impact Assessment and Risk Management. An Equality Impact Assessment has been carried out and is attached to this report.

6.0 CONSULTATIONS


