1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To advise the Committee of progress with implementation of the Communities Department Service Plan which was approved by Committee in January 2004.

2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 The Committee is asked to note the contents of the report and the progress achieved.

3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 The work reported in Appendices 1 and 2 has been funded within the revenue budget allocated by Dundee City Council during the financial year 2004/2005 and from external resources secured by the department.

4.0 LOCAL AGENDA 21 IMPLICATIONS

4.1 The work of the Communities Department addresses numerous Local Agenda 21 targets. Promoting equality and tackling disadvantage is central to the objectives of the department.

5.0 EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES IMPLICATIONS

5.1 The Communities Department plays a lead role in terms of equal opportunities work across the Council and seeks through its work with adults and young people, and its role as an employer, to promote equal opportunities.

6.0 BACKGROUND

- 6.1 The Communities Department was established in September 2003 following a review of the structure of Dundee City Council. The department is primarily responsible for delivering the following services:
 - Adult learning
 - Centres and projects
 - Community regeneration
 - Health development
 - Libraries and information
 - Children and young people
 - Corporate and Management services
- 6.2 The Service Plan was developed in response to emerging priorities and needs identified by the Local Authority, and also to national developments. One of the objectives of the restructuring was the creation of clear accountability for key areas of service at both neighbourhood and city-wide level.

- 6.3 The department has continued to depend substantially on external funding and has integrated funding from the Social Inclusion Partnership programme (now Community Regeneration Fund), Community Safety programme, European sources, and Lottery funds, to extend mainstream -funded provision.
- 6.4 During 2004/2005 the department was subject to an inspection by HMIe. The report detailed very good results across the range of inspection indicators. Dundee is the first Authority in Scotland to receive a Community Learning and Development Inspection Report with no follow-up action required.

7.0 KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

7.1 Adult Learning

- 7.1.1 Excellent progress has been made on implementation of the Literacies Action Plan. The number of adults participating in literacies programmes has been increased from 1,142 to 1,906 (exceeding the Scottish Executive target by 25%).
- 7.1.2 During 2004/2005 there were 20,286 learner visits to community learning centres in Dundee.
- 7.1.3 Three hundred and ninety eight people in Community Regeneration and ESF eligible areas requested individual adult guidance support. The evaluation of outcomes confirms very high results (90% positive outcomes) from this service.

7.2 Centres and Projects

- 7.2.1 There were 299,656 recorded user visits to Dundee's community centres during 2004-2005. This represented a drop of 7%, but is still substantially above the baseline and is not a cause for concern.
- 7.2.2 The City Council finally secured the funding package to enable the refurbishment of the Charleston Centre and this work should start on site in July 2005.
- 7.2.3 During September 2004, a baseline market research project was undertaken across all Dundee's centres with the support of the Dundee Association of Local Management Groups. This has yielded a considerable amount of valuable information in relation to centres and projects and will inform development plans for the next two years.

7.3 Community Regeneration

- 7.3.1 In March 2005, the Scottish Executive approved Dundee's Regeneration Outcome Agreement for implementation of the Community Regeneration Fund. This was the culmination of 12 months' of work for those involved in Community Regeneration in Dundee.
- 7.3.2 Local Community Plans are now established for all seven decentralisation areas and for the two BNSF areas. The first annual assessment of progress and implementation of the Plans will be completed and available in July 2005.
- 7.3.4 Neighbourhood Partnership Networks also remain in place for all seven decentralisation areas and have been well supported by Council departments and partner agencies during 2004/2005.
- 7.3.5 Dundee has participated in the piloting of national standards for community engagement.

- 7.3.6 The number of electoral wards now served by Neighbourhood Representative Structures (including community councils) has doubled since 2002/2003 to 22.
- 7.3.7 The Communities Department has developed community profiles for 20 community areas in Dundee.

7.4 Health Development

- 7.4.1 The Communities Department achieved its Bronze Award under Scotland's Health at Work and is currently progressing towards a submission for the Silver Award.
- 7.4.2 The number of young people accessing services in The Corner (Dundee's Young Persons' Health and Information Project) has been maintained at between 850 and 1,000 contacts per month. This, despite a major refurbishment of the drop-in during the last quarter of the year.
- 7.4.3 The number of "hits" on The Corner's website has been sustained at 14,000.
- 7.4.4 During 2004/2005, the City Council's Quality of Life funding enabled the department to pilot a range of healthy eating initiatives which focused on young people's eating choices. The feedback from these events has been excellent.
- 7.4.5 The Peer Education Project continues to deliver high quality peer led interventions to P7 pupils through trained S2 peer educators. The project has been externally evaluated during 2004/05 and this evaluation confirms the effectiveness of the Project. Sustaining it beyond the current funding deadlines remains a major challenge.

7.5 Library and Information

- 7.5.1 The number of unique visitors to the Council's website during the last year rose by a further 265,000 to 1,264,023.
- 7.5.2 The total number of registered members of Dundee's libraries now stands at 77,913, a marginal increase on the 2003/04 figure.
- 7.5.3 A European Computer Driving Licence (ECDL) test centre is currently under development in the Central Library.
- 7.5.4 In August 2005, four libraries (Blackness, Lochee, Broughty Ferry and Central) will become issue points for the Dundee Discovery Card.
- 7.5.5 The average number of log-ins per month has been sustained at 13,000.

7.6 Young People

- 7.6.1 There were 113,129 record ed attendances by children and young people in Dundee's centres during 2004/05. This is significantly in excess of the target figure, but is lower by 7% than the figure recorded in the previous year.
- 7.6.2 The number of young people enrolled in mainstream funded youth programmes was 38,062.
- 7.6.3 During 2004/05, the department carried a number of youth work vacancies and this, in part, accounts for the drop in attendances.
- 7.6.4 There has been a significant increase in the number of young people achieving accreditation for learning through youth programmes and for young people who have individual or group learning plans in place (540).

- 7.6.5 The number of "hits" on the local pages of the national portal (Young Scot/Dialogue Youth) has risen to 4,391 per month.
- 7.6.6 The number of young people involved in programmes at The Shore (Dundee's Youth, Music and Arts venue) is now 1,421 per month.

7.7 Community Safety

- 7.7.1 Over the last three financial years the external funding of Community Safety initiatives managed by the Communities Department has increased from £130,000 to £710,000.
- 7.7.2 Community Safety work is now a major component of the department's contribution to the quality of life in Dundee and to the building of strong, safe communities.
- 7.7.3 Throughout the year the Community Safety Wardens' Initiative has continued to receive positive feedback in the press from elected members, community representatives and partner agencies.

7.8 Equality and Diversity

- 7.8.1 The department has assisted with the development of corporate guidance on the content and format for Equality and Diversity service plans and monitoring arrangements.
- 7.8.2. The Dundee's Equality Partnership has met regularly throughout 2004/05 and will approve a constitution at its first annual general meeting to be held in the summer of 2005.

7.9 Outdoor Education

- 7.9.1 The upgrading and refurbishment of the Ancrum Outdoor Activity Centre funded in partnership with the Lottery was completed in October 2004. The refurbished facility provides an excellent base for continued development of outdoor education in Dundee.
- 7.9.2 Appendix 1 details progress made against the specific service targets set for outdoor education during 2004/2005.

8.0 CONSULTATION

8.1 The Chief Executive, Assistant Chief Executive (Community Planning) and Depute Chief Executives (Finance) and (Support Services) have been consulted and are in agreement with the contents of this report.
