#### 1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To endorse the Anti-Poverty/Social Inclusion Action Plan which has been produced by a Dundee Partnership Working Group.

#### 2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 It is recommended that Committee:
  - a) endorses the Anti-Poverty/Social Inclusion Action Plan at Appendix 1 and Appendix 3.
  - b) notes the value of Partner contributions to the production and implementation of the Plan.
  - c) requests a progress report on the Action Plan in 12 months time.

#### 3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 3.1 There are no direct financial implications arising from this report.
- 3.2 External funding will be sought for any projects which cannot be sourced through existing budgets.
- 3.3 The policy framework (Appendix 2 Section 1.2), which was previously approved by Committee, will continue to present significant challenges.

## 4.0 LOCAL AGENDA 21 IMPLICATIONS

4.1 The Action Plan aims to reduce poverty, isolation and exclusion. Implementation of the Action Plan will contribute to active citizenship, participation, promotion of dignity and an improved quality of life.

## 5.0 EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES IMPLICATIONS

5.1 Key target groups identified in the Action Plan include older people, young people, disabled people, lone parents and minority ethnic groups. The Plan recognises that social exclusion affects these groups disproportionately and includes actions aimed at combating this.

# 6. CONTEXT

# 6.1 National Policies and Priorities

- 6.1.1 The national policy context for anti poverty/social inclusion work includes the UK Social Inclusion Action Plan and the Scottish Executive Social Justice Strategy "A Scotland Where Everyone Matters". The Scottish Executive priorities include:
  - Building stronger, safer communities
  - Getting people back into work
  - Improving health
  - Raising educational attainment
  - Engaging young people
  - Effective community engagement

#### 6.2 Local Policies

- 6.2.1 Local responses to issues of poverty and social exclusion include the production of Dundee City Council's Anti-Poverty Strategy 1999 which set out a policy framework (Appendix 2) for the development of an action plan. The Dundee Community Plan also identified a number of key issues and actions as part of its work on the Social Inclusion Theme.
- 6.2.2 Dundee Anti-Poverty Forum have produced a qualitative research paper entitled "No Room for Dreams" which draws on local people's experiences of living in poverty. It identified a number of key areas for potential development of project-based initiatives to tackle poverty and social exclusion.
- 6.2.3 The new Scottish Deprivation Index data, along with census figures and small area statistics, provided detailed information about how and where Dundee's communities are affected by poverty and social exclusion. In addition, the recent Joseph Rowntree Foundation Report "Monitoring Poverty and Social Exclusion in Scotland 2004" gave some local analysis of change over time and differences between groups in the population. The local findings from this report have been analysed with a view to incorporating them with the Action Plan as appropriate.

# 7.0 ANTI-POVERTY/SOCIAL INCLUSION WORKING GROUP

- 7.1 As the Community Planning process developed, key themes emerged which reflect the Scottish Executive priorities, but also highlighted the need for a different approach to social inclusion originally identified as a specific Community Planning Theme. The Dundee Partnership Management Group decided to establish the Anti-Poverty/Social Inclusion Working Group as a cross-cutting Working Group. Their intention in doing this was to facilitate the mainstreaming of Anti-Poverty and Social Inclusion issues into all aspects of the Partnership's work.
- 7.2 The Anti-Poverty/Social Inclusion Working Group draws its membership from:
  - the six Community Planning Theme groups/Dundee City Council service departments.
  - Tayside NHS Board/Dundee CHP
  - Communities Scotland
  - Scottish Enterprise Tayside
  - Local Community Regeneration Fund members
  - the Xplore Partnership
  - the Equality and Diversity Partnership
  - Job Centre Plus
  - Dundee Anti-Poverty Forum
- 7.3 The group was remitted to:
  - review the existing Anti-Poverty Strategy
  - review national and local policy and research
  - incorporate new data into the planning process as appropriate
  - produce an Action Plan for tackling poverty and social exclusion in Dundee
- 7.4 The group has achieved this by working closely with Community Planning Theme Groups and Partners while they were reviewing and evaluating their work. This helped to identify existing strategies which linked closely with Anti-Poverty/Social Inclusion issues identified during the review.

Some of the existing strategies and initiatives addressing poverty in Dundee include:

- Working for Families
- Literacies Initiatives
- Promoting healthy eating and exercise in schools and communities
- Identify support needs of black and minority ethnic communities
- Improve career advice, training opportunities and access to jobs for excluded groups

This process identified which Anti-Poverty/Social Inclusion priorities were not being addressed by other partnership, strategies or frameworks. These priorities formed the basis of the Action Plan which will be implemented by the Anti-Poverty/Social Inclusion Working Group.

The Anti-Poverty/Social Inclusion Working Group will ensure there is a mechanism in place for monitoring the impact of policies on poverty and social exclusion (See Action Item 13 on Anti-Poverty/Social Inclusion Plan).

7.5 The group has also identified the key department, agency and partnership structure best suited to progressing each action and has put in place monitoring and review procedures to ensure effective implementation and updating of the Plan (Appendix 3). This will be facilitated by lead officers from the Anti-Poverty/Social Inclusion Working Group linking with departments and agencies.

#### 8.0 CONCLUSION

8.1 The Anti-Poverty/Social Inclusion Action Plan has established a mechanism for the mainstreaming of Anti-Poverty and Social Inclusion measures into all aspects of the Community Planning process. Regular monitoring and reviewing of both the Plan and the Group's remit will ensure that this remains an effective method for tackling poverty and social exclusion in Dundee.

#### 9.0 CONSULTATION

9.1 Consultation has taken place with the Chief Executive, Depute Chief Executives (Finance and Support Services) and all members of the Council's Management Team. The Dundee Partnership Building Stronger Communities Theme Group and the Dundee Partnership Coordinating Group will be consulted prior to presentation to Council.
