- 4.1 The Dundee Community Safety Partnership Annual Report 2009 2010 reports on progress of the Community Safety Strategy 2009 2012 and Action Plan 1 April 2009 31 March 2010 agreed by Committee on 27 April 2009, Report No 205-2009 refers.
- 4.2 The key achievements outlined within the report include:

1.0 Co-Chairperson Report

During the period 1 April 2009 - 31 March 2010 the Dundee Community Safety Partnership has continued to drive the Community Safety Theme of the Dundee Community Plan on behalf of the Dundee Partnership. The Dundee Community Safety Partnership priorities within the Community Safety Strategy 2009 - 2012 are:

- Reduce crime in groups 1 4
- Feeling safer
- Reducing wilful fire-raising
- Community tension and counter terrorism
- Prostitution
- Home safety and accident prevention
- Substance misuse
- Partnership working

In addition, the Dundee Community Safety Partnership continues to take responsibility for the implementation of the Community Safety Section of the Dundee Partnership's Single Outcome Agreement.

Dundee Community Safety Partnership is recognised nationally as one of the four or five top performing Community Safety Partnerships in Scotland.

It is testament to the hard work and innovative approaches by partners that in spite of severe financial constraints, Dundee Community Safety Partnership has delivered on its promise to ensure Dundee's communities will be safe and feel safe.

Key achievements include:

- ➤ 11% reduction in recorded crime
- > 25% reduction in serious assaults and robberies
- > 34% reduction in people charged with carrying offensive weapons
- > 29% reduction in Youth Causing Annoyance
- > 11% reduction in vandalism
- > 11% increase of those who perceive crime had decreased in their neighbourhood
- 9% increase of those receiving antisocial behaviour to be an infrequent occurrence in their neighbourhood
- Purchase of Mobile Youth Resource Vehicle
- Vice Versa model hailed as best practice
- > Reduction in secondary fires
- Quarterly tactical document prepared for Local Community Planning Partnership

Group 1 - Serious and Violent Crime

Includes violent crime against the person – murder, attempted murder, serious assault, abduction, threats and robbery. Offences of careless driving where death is caused and where the driver is disqualified or unlicensed. The more serious non-sexual offences against children and some firearms offences also fall into this category.

Group 2 - Sexual crimes

Rape, lewd and libidinous practices, sexual intercourse with children under 16, prostitution offences, conspiracy to commit sexual acts outside the UK, grooming of children, procuration of sexual services from children

Group 3 - Crimes of Dishonesty

Covers all crimes involving theft (housebreaking, vehicle crime, shoplifting etc) but also reset (receiving stolen property), embezzlement, fraud, forgery, corruption, currency offences and proceeds of crime.

Group 4 - Miscellaneous

Covers crimes involving damage to property (fire-raising, vandalism, reckless damage, malicious mischief) and also reckless conduct (with or without firearms).

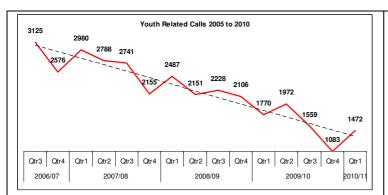

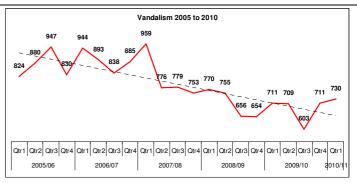
Five year trend graphs for crime and disorder in Dundee. 2010/ 11 projection calculated by multiplying the Q1 figure by 4.

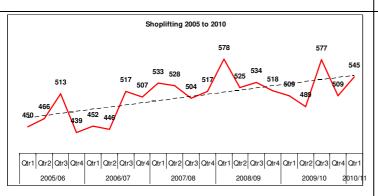

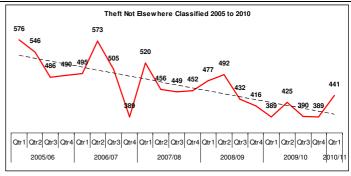

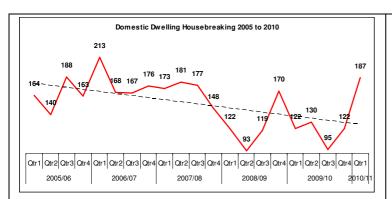

Other possibilities are: shops dealing more robustly, or improved security allowing them to detect more shoplifters.

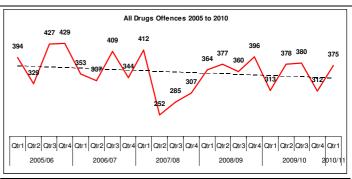

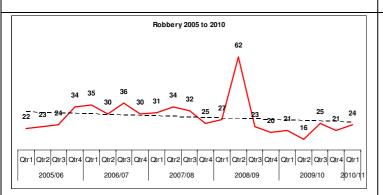

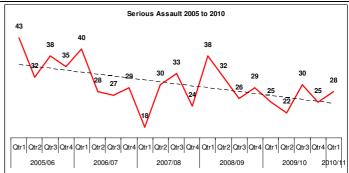

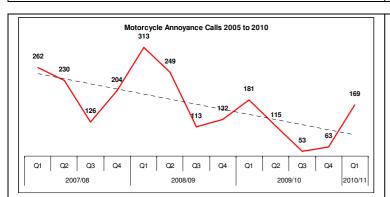

A year by year seasonal downward trend is apparent in motorcycle nuisance calls received which is primarily due to the effect of operation Challenge. Generic high-risk times remain 1600-2100 hours. These calls are typically with groups of youths joyriding on motorcycle type vehicles with a number of these being assessed as stolen.

The high levels seen in 2007/ 08 and 2008/ 09 have subsided considerably.

Secondary fire incidents continue to increase on a seasonal basis during the autumn months however there is a general decline in occurrences being received than in previous years.

In previous years there have been considerable problems around Guy Fawkes' Night. There has been considerable joint working between Tayside Fire and Rescue and Tayside Police which has had a considerable impact on the level of fire setting at this time of year. I MINUTE OF MEETING OF ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF 21ST AUGUST, 2008

The minute of the above meeting was approved.

II CO-CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

There was submitted the Co-Chairperson's report, detailing the achievements of the Partnership for the period 1st April to 31st March, 2009, a copy of which is appended to the minute. It was noted that the Partnership was responsible for the Community Safety Theme under the Single Outcome Agreement for the Dundee Partnership and that through this a major contribution had been made to the Dundee Partnership's Building Stronger Communities Theme. Accordingly, changes had been made to the operation of the group, with full membership attending Strategic meetings and separate Operational Group meetings.

Furthermore, sub-groups had been created to address specific issues which arose throughout the year, and which would be kept under constant review.

Reference was also made to the role of Community Safety Networks and the importance of those for giving local communities a forum to discuss issues of local concern.

The importance of the Strategic Assessment was also highlighted, and how this document had been used not only to develop an intelligence led tasking approach, but also develop the Partnership's Community Safety Strategy and Action Plan for the period 2009-2012 to include the undernoted priorities:-

reducing crime in Groups 1-4

- making people feel safer
- reducing wilful fire raising
- community tension and counter-terrorism
- prostitution
- home safety and accident prevention
- substance misuse
- partnership working

The removal of ring-fenced funding for the delivery of DCSP activities would remain a concern in the current economic climate. However, some additional funding did come to Dundee from the Scottish Government during 2008-09 in the form of Cashback for Communities Funding generated through the proceeds of crime.

Additional funding was also made available by the Scottish Government to support the development of the Prostitution Initiative which aimed to support vulnerable women to access routes out of their chaotic lifestyles.

Safer Street monies from the Scottish Government, albeit at a reduced level for the period 2008-09, supported the introduction of polycarbonate glasses into pubs and clubs, additional policing levels during the festive season and additional diversionary activities for young people. It was noted that a major challenge for the Partnership during the coming year would be the delivery of the DCSP Action Plan and the Dundee Partnership's Single Outcome Agreement, at a time when there would be increased pressure to deliver outcomes with a reduced level of resources.

January 2009 saw the retiral of Tony Boffey and a change of duties for Steven Millar, which meant a changeover in co-chairing responsibilities for the Dundee Community Safety Partnership. On behalf of the Partnership, the co-chairs offered Tony best wishes for his retirement and to Steven in his future career with Tayside Police.

In conclusion it was noted that on a recent visit, Richard Foggo, the senior Scottish Government Official with responsibility for Community Safety, made a comment that Dundee was one of the highest performing Community Safety Partnerships in Scotland. This was testament indeed to all the hard work and commitment put into the Partnership from all those involved, particularly Liz Kay and Bryan Knight.

III ACCOUNTS 2008-2009

Three Statements of Accounts were submitted for the various funding awards:-

(a) COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP AWARD

It was noted that various initiatives had been able to be supported, such as Victim Support, Bulky Uplifts, Tayside Police ASB Unit Bikes, Youth Diversionary Activities, further support to Operation Dry-Up, Tayside Police Body mounted CCTV and Target Hardening. An underspend of £34,215 remained, which would not be able to be carried forward to future years.

(b) LOCAL ACTION FUND

Members noted the Diversionary works which had been supported throughout the City. It was also noted that the underspend would be allocated in due course.

(c) COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP AWARD - SAFER STREETS INITIATIVE

Members noted that this award had resulted in additionality of weekend Police Officers and an increase in weekend events at The Shore.

Thereafter the Partnership approved the accounts as submitted.

V CRIMESTOPPERS GRANTS

Awards paid out through Crimestoppers monies were submitted and noted.

VI DUNDEE COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP INITIATIVES 2008-09

It was reported that various initiatives had been supported throughout 2008-2009 including:-

Local Action Fund

Activities supported included 757 opportunities for young people to participate in Diversionary Activities. In addition to this, a motorcycle project had been supported in

conjunction with the Anti-Social Behaviour Team, with a total of four courses being provided.

Target Hardening

Victims of house-breaking were continuing to be supported. This project was now not only reactive, but also proactive with awareness of measures available being provided in certain geographic areas. It was envisaged that the concept of Target Hardening would also be broadened to include further preventative home safety measures i.e. smoke alarms, appliance testing.

Operation Dry-Up

A youth consultation document had been commissioned by the Partnership and it was anticipated that the findings of this would be linked to Operation Dry Up, thus creating a partnership approach. Members also noted that a mobile resource would greatly enhance works in this field.

Environmental Clean-Up

Paul Raeper provided members with an update on this project. It was reported that an interagency protocol had been agreed for the removal of waste and that this was continuing to operate successfully.

Outdoor Education

Ancrum Outdoor Education Centre was continuing to provide activities for young people, and all feedback received was extremely positive.

Dundee Violence Against Women Partnership/Vice Versa

It was reported that Partnership Working with Dundee Violence against Women Partnership was continuing to operate successfully. Furthermore, the Vice Versa project aimed to support on-street prostitutes.

ASB Bikes

It was noted that funding had enabled Tayside Police to purchase four folding bikes which had enabled officers to be deployed quickly in open spaces where required.

Body Cameras

It was reported that the provision of these cameras had proven to be invaluable for identification purposes; and also for gathering evidence of anti-social activities. Members further noted that due to the success of this initiative, its expansion was being explored.

Safer Streets

Members noted that in addition to the increase in weekend Police Officers, a pilot had commenced regarding the use of polycarbonate glasses within city centre

establishments, an evaluation of which would be provided at a later date. If successful it was anticipated that this may be introduced within other city areas.

Personal Safety

Members noted that the Delphinus Group had been developed to deliver the contest strategy. It was noted that Tayside Police were not capable of delivering Act Now and sessions within the community.

VII MONITORING AND EVALUATION

It was noted that a Fit for Purpose review of the Partnership had been undertaken, the full results of which would be available on receipt of all responses.

VIII ANALYSIS OF STRATEGIC ASSESSMENT DOCUMENT

An analysis document was submitted by Bryan Knight of Tayside Police, a copy of which is appended to the minute.

This document provided a three year comparison for the undernoted issues:-

Youths Causing Annoyance

It was noted this was continuing to decrease on an annual basis.

Vandalism

The forecast for this was continual reduction.

Shoplifting

Credit was paid to the DUNCAN scheme for their involvement in this.

Theft

Although continuing to reduce, increases were noted before the festive period.

Housebreaking

A less positive result had been provided free for the current period, possible due to the current economic climate.

Drugs

A proactive approach by officers had led to an increase in drugs related crimes being reported. It was noted that the majority of crimes were in relation to heroin, giving unpredictable crime types.

Robbery

Again, this crime type was often linked to drug users. A reduction was anticipated for the year end projection.

Assault

It was noted that the reduction in assaults was largely due to the success of the Best Bar None scheme.

Motorcycle Nuisance

A year by year seasonal downturn was apparent. Furthermore, in respect of the motorcycle initiative there was a drop in yearly offending by course attendees.

Motorcycle Theft

It was reported that this was also continuing to decline.

Secondary Fires

Partnership working was instrumental in the decrease projected.

IX FUTURE PRIORITIES FOR 2009

It was reported that the main priority of the Partnership was to achieve co-location, as this would greatly assist in achieving outcomes listed in the Action Plan. Members noted that a dedicated group had been established to drive this forward.

Furthermore, data sharing was also a priority, and an analyst group was working to ensure the strategic documents were kept up to date.

Finally it was noted that the Dundee Partnership Awards would take place on Friday, 6th November, 2009, and members were asked to advise the Co-Chairs of their intention to attend.
