### 1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To inform committee of the savings proposed for financial year 2023-24 regarding travel costs associated with City Campus/Consortia arrangements.

### 2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 It is recommended, with the introduction of free bus travel for all Under 22's, it is proposed to remove the current taxi arrangements for children attending Consortia Arrangements or the City Campus, unless there are exceptional circumstances.

#### 3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 The implementation of this proposal will result in a saving amounting to £44,000 in financial year 2023/24 and £70,000 in a full financial year.

### 4.0 MAIN TEXT

- 4.1 The University of Dundee previously catered for City Campus for Advanced Higher Subjects not delivered in home schools. Young people travelled on service buses to City Centre to attend the University. This provision was for S6 pupils studying Advanced Highers. Since COVID, the City Campus has not returned to the University and the Campus classes are delivered on a Tuesday and Thursday afternoon in the school where the delivering subject teacher is at. Currently these young people get a taxi to the host school from their own school and then to home.
- 4.2 It is proposed the City Campus will return to the University for session 2023/24 which will mean, with the introduction of free bus travel for all Under 22's, young people will be able to use the public bus service to attend their classes on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons.
- 4.2 There are a number of young people from S5 and S6 who travel to other schools on Consortia Arrangements for Highers and Advanced Highers. These are more frequent and can be daily for some young people. Currently a taxi is provided to take the young people to the delivering school and return to home school after the lesson. With the introduction of free bus travel for all Under 22's, young people will be able to use the public bus service, where appropriate.
- 4.3 In some circumstances it might still be necessary to provide taxi transport, but these should be far less frequent than has previously arisen.

### 5.0 POLICY IMPLICATIONS

5.1 This report has been subject to an Integrated Impact Assessment to identify impacts on Equality & Diversity, Fairness & Poverty, Environment and Corporate Risk. An impact, positive or negative, on one or more of these issues was identified. An appropriate senior manager has checked and agreed with this assessment.
