1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 This report provides the City Governance Committee with details of continued measures to reconfigure and improve support to vulnerable families and care experienced children and young people which will facilitate savings and avoid longer-term costs.

2 RECOMMENDATION

- 2.1 It is recommended that the Committee:
 - a Approves continued measures to reconfigure and improve support to vulnerable families and care experienced children and young people, which will also achieve a saving of £1.412m in 2025-26.

3 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

This proposal will contribute towards the Council continuing to operate within budget in 2025-26. The plan and targets will be overseen by fortnightly data on the number and profile of care experienced children and young people alongside associated costs.

4 BACKGROUND

- 4.1 Since the publication of the Independent Care Review in February 2020, the Council has been embarking on a programme of transformational change in the way we provide support to vulnerable families and care experienced children and young people.
- 4.2 Initiatives like New Beginnings, Pause, Safe and Together, Social Work/NHST Nurse teams, Functional Family Therapy, audits of practice and workforce development have been designed to improve support to parents/carers and promote nurturing care.
- 4.3 They have contributed towards a minimum of 5% annual reductions in the total number of children and young people requiring alternative care from 450 in July 2020 to 385 in July 2024 and reductions in the total gross expenditure from £28.9m in 2020-21 to £26.2m in 2023-24.
- 4.4 At the same time, other initiatives to build local care capacity and reduce an over-reliance on external care have also been introduced, such as a new Kinship Team, a new Young Person's House and new or re-provisioned supported accommodation for care leavers.
- 4.5 This has contributed towards a marked reduction in an average of 31 children and young people in external residential care over the last 5 years to a current 21 and only 1 young person in secure care over the last 20 months.
- 4.6 Over the period, the gross expenditure on family-based care has therefore reduced from £14.2m to £12.8m. For residential care, it has dropped from £14.7m to £13.3m. The balance of family-based care is currently 91%, above the national average of 89%.

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4.7 In tandem with these developments, targeted support in schools has also been enhanced and the proportion of care experienced young people achieving SCQF Level 5 or above has increased by 24% and the proportion achieving SCQF Level 6 or above by 20%.

5 Further Developments

- 5.1 In Our Promise to Care Experienced Children and Young People 2023-26, the Council has committed to maintaining this ambitious programme to support vulnerable families, improve outcomes for care experienced children and young people and reduce costs by:
 - Allocation of Scottish Government Whole Family Wellbeing Funding of £3.4m to 16 new projects up to March 2026
 - A review of current Children's Social Work commissioned services which currently cost a combined total of £2.3m to ensure they provide Best Value
- 5.2 Given sustained reductions in the number of children and young people living with internal Foster Carers, which has declined from 144 in 2020 to a current 89 and places restrictions on available capacity, it is also proposed that a formal review of fees/allowances is carried out.
- 5.3 The annual cost of these placements is £1.7m, compared with £4.4m for the same number of children and young people with external Foster Carers. A review would benchmark with private providers and neighbouring areas and may invite invest to save proposals.
- 5.4 These continued developments are intended to drive towards sustaining 5% annual reductions in the number of children and young people requiring alternative care and in increases in the number in local family-based or residential care.

6 Targets

- On the basis of long-term trends and these sustained or new measures, the total number of care experienced children and young people would reduce by a minimum of 5% from the current 385 to 365 in 2025-26; 347 in 2026-27; and 340 in 2027-28.
- 6.2 Similarly, the number in external residential care would reduce by a minimum of 3 per year over the same period, from the current 21 to 18 in 2025-26; 15 in 2026-27; and 12 in 2027-28. Efforts to minimise the number of young people in secure care will be maintained.
- 6.3 It is anticipated that this continued re-balance will achieve a further reduction in costs by £1.412m in 2025-26. As services are demand-led and subject to some volatility, such as a large group of siblings requiring alternative care, targets will be continually monitored. Other mitigations include:
 - Maintaining capacity within Social Work teams to provide and/or coordinate necessary support to parents/carers and children and young people
 - Routine internal and partnership self-evaluation on types and levels of risk of harm,
 thresholds of intervention and identification of any unmet need
 - Continuing to expand available support to Kinship Carers which currently includes Welfare Rights assessments and support from a network of local services.
- 6.4 The proposed review of commissioned services and internal Foster Carer fees/allowances would also provide opportunities to enhance and/or appropriately target preventative support and build the availability of local family-based care.

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7 POLICY IMPLICATIONS

7.1 This report has been subject to an Integrated Impact Assessment to identify impacts on Equality & Diversity, Fairness & Poverty, Environment and Corporate Risk. An impact, positive or negative, on one or more of these issues was identified. An appropriate senior manager has checked and agreed with this assessment. Intended Outcome:

Description:

The intended outcomes are to reduce the overall number of care experienced children and young people; increase the number in local family-based or residential care where alternative arrangements are required; maintain links with local communities, schools, families and peers; improve educational attainment; and reduce costs.

Period Covered: 27/02/2025 to 27/03/2026

Monitoring:

The service delivery and financial aspects of the proposal will be monitored through fortnightly data on the number of children and young people requiring alternative care, the balance of local versus external care arrangements and associated costs. Related developments will be monitored through weekly management meetings.
