

About Together to Thrive

The aim of Together to Thrive is to improve the wellbeing of children (aged 5-11) and their families where there are concerns about their child's (neuro) development.

CAMHS are working in partnership with the Mental Health Foundation and local organisations to provide training and support for community-based staff. This will give them the skills, knowledge and confidence to help families in areas including poor sleep, sensory awareness, positive behaviour support, family relationships and the impact of difficult experiences.

Families involved in the project will also be given access to an online resource created by CAMHS Tayside, which is full of useful info, tips and strategies.





How will it work?

Families will have a worker from one of the local organisations to support them or may be invited to join a Together to Thrive Group with other parents.

How long support lasts will vary from family to family.



Already waiting for CAMHS?

Together to Thrive is separate from any future support families may receive from mental health services and getting involved won't affect where families are if currently on the waiting list for CAMHS.

This means you won't be seen quicker, but it also won't slow down your wait, in any way.

The	feedback included:
	 A range of opportunities for children, young people and adults were mentioned including breakfast clubs, after schools clubs, community cafes, advice drop in's as well as work going on in specific projects such as Friends of Linalthen and Mid Craigie, Big Noise, Andy Man's Club
	Some of the biggest challenges mentioned were cost of living, housing, social isolation and community anxiety about existing community spaces and buildings
	3. Areas that were identified as missing in the community plan included how we are sharing information locally about opportunities and support for people experiencing domestic violence. There was also points raised about St Pius Primary not being the feeder primary for a High School in the East End and therefore not always being included in opportunities for extra support, the example given was around transition.
