Message from the Leader of the Administration

Dundee City Council works year-round to serve the people of Dundee. In doing so, we invest funds in a wide variety of services which we know are of importance to you – from education to economic development, and everything in between.

At its recent budget setting meeting the council agreed to increase the Council Tax by 4.75% for 2023/2024, which starts on April 1, meaning a band D house will now pay £1486.43. This additional income will be used in part to fund the examples on the right of this letter.

Our services are often lifelines to citizens and this budget builds on previous budgets by investing in measures to tackle poverty and inequalities.

We know that the cost-of-living crisis has meant many are facing significant challenges in making ends meet. But we have been doing everything we can to try to minimise the effects on the city and its people.

Over the last 12 months, we have invested more than £2 million in support for fuel & debt advice services, in providing direct grant support through our FuelWell scheme and funding for food larders and foodbanks. We've also recently increased the tenant hardship fund to £1 million to support council tenants in need.

Over winter, support has included a Winter Food Fund, warm clothes and blankets, a city-wide activity programme and support for people having difficulty paying rising fuel bills.

It is, of course, a depressing thought that such things are required in the UK in 2023. As a council, we are focussed on supporting our citizens and we will continue to do so going forward whilst also attempting to create new employment and growth.

Despite the difficulties faced, we also know that the city has some exciting opportunities on the horizon. It is those challenges that drive us forward and ultimately, determine our ambitious agenda for the city.

In increasingly difficult financial circumstances, we are focussed on improving life in the city for the people who live here.

The city's renewal over the last decade has brought investment and opportunity to Dundee and we can all see the new housing, office buildings and leisure facilities under construction right now.

In addition, the council has committed to the building of a new secondary school campus in the east of the city and a new primary school at the Western Gateway. We are also investing more than £100 million in tackling the climate emergency, reducing our carbon footprint and boosting opportunities for active and sustainable travel. Finally, we continue to work with partners to generate investment and to create jobs, from the Port of Dundee to the Michelin Scotland Innovation Parc, our

city is making noticeable waves. We will not stop in our relentless pursuit of

improvement. Our bold and ambitious plans will continue to be driven by your needs, hopes and aspirations.
