## **Document Description:**

The production of a Local Food Growing Strategy is a requirement under Part 9 Allotments of the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act 2015. All local authorities in Scotland have a duty to prepare such a strategy by 1st April 2020. Due to the COVID19 the adoption of the Local Food Growing Strategy has been delayed.

The Local Growing Strategy has a vision of: Dundee will build on its enviable resource of community growing spaces and allotments, working with communities, local people and organisations to enable them to access 'grow your own' opportunities, whilst recognising the value of such growing spaces in reducing food insecurity.



Dundee's Local Food Growing Strategy seeks to provide opportunities for all to participate in growing their own. The strategy sets out existing growing opportunities such as traditional allotments, where waiting times are well within prescribed time limits (Community Empowerment Scotland Act 2015) as well as Community Growing Spaces. It also identifies potential areas for the expansion of growing areas. Since 2015, Dundee City Council has invested approximately £200,000 of capital funding in the development of Growing Spaces, particularly focusing on areas of regeneration. Involving local people in the development of these spaces is key, encouraging use by local groups and individuals.

The Local Food Growing Strategy encourages communities to develop growing spaces. Support is available from Dundee City Council's Community Allotment Officer who has worked in partnership with colleagues, local people and organisations to set up a number of growing spaces throughout Dundee.
